Fifteen Thousand People Had a Shock Lived Panic

Schenectady, N.Y., May 21.—Fifteen thousand people were thrown into a panic yesterday afternoon, when the main tent of Barnum & Bailey's circus was burned. Circus employees and police were on the spot almost immediately, and succeeded in getting the frantic women and children safe from the blazing tent. One woman was injured and hundreds fainted and were carried out by the police and firemen. The fire is thought to have started from a lighted match being dropped by a boy in the bleachers. It started on a guy rope and climbed to the ceiling, where it communicated with the canvas and the entire tent was consumed in less than half an hour.

A BALLOON RAN WILD INVADED CANADA

Some Amateur Astronomers Were Up in the Air to See the Comet

Pass By

Montreal, May 22.—Prof. D. A. Todd of Amherst college, Massachusetts, and three companions arrived here on Saturday from St. Hyacinthe, after an exciting balloon voyage. On Friday evening Prof. Todd and three friends ascended in a balloon from North Adams, Mass., with the object of making observations and taking photographs of Halley's comet.

When the balloon had ascended several thousand feet it was caught in a strong current of air, which drove it towards the border at a rapid speed. All night the balloon was carried on its way, and early in the morning it descended at St. Hyacinthe, about twenty-five miles from this city, having covered the distance of about 250 miles in twelve hours, and made the first successful balloon invasion of Canada from the United States.

The Automobile and Aero Club of Canada has offered a cup for the balloon which shall come nearest Dominion Square in this city from any point in New York, Connecticut or Massachusetts, south of latitude of 42° north, during 1909 or 1910, and, strange to say, without any intention of doing so. Prof. Todd and his party have come pretty near to winning the trophy.

MORGAN PREPARING FOR MERGER OF BONDS

Proposes to Form One Great Central Institution Which Will Have Good Effect

Chicago, May 22.—G. E. Roberts, president of the Commercial Bank of Chicago, at a luncheon of the Hawkeye Fellowship club, yesterday said that J. P. Morgan had obtained control of the National City Bank of Chicago, and that he was preparing to form a great central institution. "Among the cities that will probably be represented," said Mr. Roberts, "are Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul, Minneapolis, St. Louis, Seattle, Portland, San Francisco, New Orleans, Buffalo, Atlanta and Detroit."

As a result, dangers of a repetition of what occurred in the panic of 1907 will be obviated.

Calgary C. C. 145 vs. Macleod C. C. 101

The Calgary Cricket club journeyed to Macleod on Friday night to play the latter on their grounds on Saturday. The visitors were met at the station by representatives of the home club. The morning dawned bright, giving the cricketers assurance of an ideal day for the game, which started at eleven a.m.

Calgary, winning the toss, sent the Macleod eleven to bat. Messrs. Napper and Hatch faced the bowling of the first wicket, made the first wicket falling to J. S. Spick for 20 runs. No stand was then made by the home team until the fifth wicket fell, when Mercer joined Napper and the score was carried to sixty-one, Napper being bowled by a first-class ball from Spick; Mercer falling to Johnson two overs later. By the last wicket made twenty-eight runs, due to the good batting of M. Macleod with Bagley as a partner. The last wicket of the Macleod batting fell to Napper, Mercer and Macleod, the latter being not out. In this innings J. S. Spick bowled exceedingly well, taking six wickets for 28 runs.

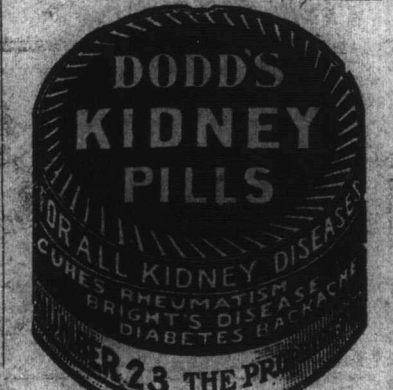
