

C. C. ZWICKER KILLED IN RIVERSIDE AUTO ACCIDENT

Faulty Steering Gear Causes Car to Crash Through Fence Between Boulevard and Bow River. Pinning Victim Beneath Capsized Machine.

THREE OTHER OCCUPANTS NOT SERIOUSLY INJURED

D. J. McCarthy Sustains Painful Injury to Shoulder, but Driver of Machine and Remaining Passenger Escape Unharmed

CARL C. ZWICKER, 214 Thirteenth street, was killed yesterday morning in an automobile accident which occurred on the boulevard between the bridge and a short distance east of the Langevin bridge.

Howday and McCarthy engaged the car at the E. P. E. depot about 2 o'clock, and under instructions, Carlin headed for Nose Creek. Zwicker, a friend of Carlin, accompanied the driver, sitting in the front seat. Witnesses state that after crossing the bridge the steering gear of the car became unmanageable, and Carlin was unable to make a turn as the machine was passing the old stone crushing plant on the north side of the river.

Crashed Through Board Fence Howday states that the car was traveling at a rate of 30 miles an hour when the accident occurred. The car had gone about three blocks after crossing the bridge, declared Howday, when it suddenly crashed through a board fence.

Carlin, who drove the car, claims substantially the same story. He says that he did not have a speedometer, but judged his rate of speed at about 15 or 20 miles an hour. The headlights were in operation, Carlin declares, but did not see the board fence until it was too late to stop. Carlin has been driving a public car since November, 1911, and claims to have driven thoroughly. He was aware of the location of the turn, but when he attempted to shift his gear to round the curve the steering wheel jammed.

The automobile is owned by Mr. George Parr. The damage to the car is in the neighborhood of \$400. Zwicker, the victim of the accident, was also a chauffeur. He was a married man, and leaves a wife and two children, one being an infant in arms. At an inquest held in Harrison & Foster's parlors yesterday afternoon, Charles Carlin was exonerated from all blame to the death of Zwicker, the coroner's jury holding that the badly lighted condition of the boulevard was responsible. The verdict in full is as follows:

We, the coroner's jury, after hearing the evidence and viewing the place where the accident occurred, and unanimously agree that Zwicker, deceased, came to his death by the car coming into contact with the carriage owing to the badly lighted road, and falling down the embankment, and we attach no blame to the chauffeur, Charles Carlin.
