

McDOUGALL IS FOUND NOT GUILTY ON A MURDER CHARGE

Takes Short Time to Come to Decision on Serious Charge Against Half-Breed—Evil Effects of Liquor on Indians Commented on

SISTER OF ACCUSED WIFE OF DECEASED

Man Charged With Murder Took Stand in His Own Behalf and Denied All Intention of Hurting or Killing Joe Paul

Beatrice McDougall, the half-breed, was yesterday acquitted on the charge of the murder of Joe Paul. The jury took but a short time to reach their decision, which was the second of the present session of the criminal assizes and the second of the present term of the court.

McDougall was accused of having caused the death of Paul in a drunken fight at Nose Creek on March 30 last, Paul having died the day following.

On the resumption of the case yesterday morning, the accused himself took the stand as the first witness in his defense. He said that he was in a way connected with any of those who had given evidence against him, and that he had stated that they were related to him in their evidence. Joe Paul, he declared, was a heavy drinker and had been drinking heavily on the day before his death. They had had several bottles of alcohol, but smoker Campbell, one of the number, got some whiskey of a Scotch brand, which they drank also. It did not take long on the stand also. It did not take long on the stand for the liquor to disappear.

Friendly With Deceased.

McDougall said he was friendly with the deceased man who was his sister's husband, but Paul was very drunk on the Sunday and started swearing at McDougall and started against the accused and his sister. McDougall told him to stop, but he continued, as he was very drunk. They then started to wrestle, and there was a general scramble in the tent, as the others, particularly Campbell and Josephine Isbister, tried to separate them.

McDougall said Paul tore his shirt from his back and every time he tried to get up, Campbell and the others pushed him down on the top of Paul. McDougall said that he had struck Paul in the face and the latter then fell to the ground, but soon jumped up and attacked the accused once more. Another time he was struck on the nose and fell once more to the ground.

Objects to Leading Questions.

There were considerable counter-questions between the counsel, James Scott, C. C. and Mr. Peacock, the former who acted as crown prosecutor, and the latter who acted as defense counsel. McDougall objects to leading questions. His honor, Justice Scott, upheld the crown. Mr. Scott claimed that the counsel for the defense was framing up the story for the defense. Mr. Peacock objected strongly to the words, and only when the judge asked him to proceed was the examination resumed.

McDougall denied with emphasis that he had either jumped or stood on the chest of the deceased, and said he had never had any intention of hurting or killing Paul.

In the cross-examination he said he had been twice in jail for stealing. He confessed to knocking Paul down twice, inside and outside of the tent. He was drawn away by the others who were present.

Madeline Paul, the sister of the accused, was called to the stand.

exact location. The Norwegian flag was planted on the pole.

The party had set out with over 50 dogs and four sleighs. They travelled in the dash to the pole over 930 miles, and the return journey was made in 39 days. Eleven dogs got back to home and safety, but one only has survived the adventure and reached Norway this week.

Amundsen's Fine Touches.

There were some fine touches added to the lecture by the great explorer, as when he told of the hoisting of the flag to greet the furthest point of Shackleton, his reference to the course of Scott from McMurdo Sound to the pole, and his death on the way back; his unfaltering faith in the Fram, the host which holds the world's records for furthest north and furthest south; and his deep respect for Captain Nilsen and the other members of the party.

Great interest was taken in the lecture, which was illustrated with pictures of the old kind and also moving pictures of the expedition.

The little republic of Hvalfoll does not follow the course and crude Mexican method of disposing of unpopular rulers. The recent death of President Aguinaldo is said to have been caused by a fall from a horse.

Amundsen says it is a fallacy to suppose that men from 25 to 30 stand the hardships of polar travel better than older men. The best ages, he says, are from 35 to 45.

Three of the remaining four of the ship's company will be Captain Amundsen, himself; Dr. Harry Edmunds, an Englishman, now residing in San Francisco, who will be the physician of the party; and John Birkeland, a meteorologist. The fourth man, who will be an oceanographer, is not yet chosen.

First Foreign Ship Through Panama.

At present, the Fram is being refitted at Buenos Ayres. She came through her last grueling with practically no damage, although for her next expedition improvements and alterations, suggested by experience, are being made. In October, the Panama canal will be opened, it is expected, and the first vessel to sail through it after the United States ships of war will be the Fram. She will proceed immediately to San Francisco, where Capt. Amundsen will join her. Her own crew will sail her from Buenos Ayres.
