Released From Holloway Jail
After Brief Period: Physicians
Say She Was Exhausted

London, June 16.—A "hunger strike" once more brought about the release from jail of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader, today. She was set free on license at Holloway jail this afternoon, owing to ill-health. Mrs. Pankhurst was removed from ambulance to a nursing home. Although the period in which she abstained from food was very brief, the physicians in attendance said that she never was so exhausted. The license on which Mrs. Pankhurst was released will expire on June 23.

NO SHIPBUILDING PLANT IN
CHARLOTTETOWN

Ottawa, June 16.—The story to the effect that the government will establish a big shipbuilding plant in Charlottetown, to which publicity was given by a local paper on Saturday, a despatch from the Maritime provinces today states that the plan is not being considered. The statement that the estimates contained a vote of \$100,000 to commence the enterprise at Charlottetown, borne out by a reference to the records. In official circles it is stated that the subject has not been considered, and those who know Charlottetown say that it would be an unlikely place for a naval yard to be established.

Grain Is Growing Fast, Though
Rain Is Needed in Some

Winnipeg, June 16.—Grain all along the line of the Canadian Northern Railway is reported in advanced stage, and the prospects for a bumper crop are excellent. Crops are in some instances 15 inches high, and while in a few districts rain would be beneficial, in most of them there is plenty of moisture in the ground.

Along the main line east and west the grain is growing fast, and is seven or eight inches above the ground. Reports from all branches of the railway indicate that "conditions are good and prospects never brighter" with wheat averaging from six to nine inches

FIRE IN TORONTO; DAMAGE
QUARTER OF MILLION

Large Tannery and Leather
Factory of Wickett and
Craig Destroyed

Toronto, June 16.—Fire broke out in the large tannery and leather factory of Wickett & Craig, shortly before midnight, and rapidly developed into a serious conflagration, enveloping the whole of the big factory building, which fronts on Front street and extends from Front street to Eastern avenue, and threatening all adjoining buildings.

Immediately behind the factory is the city crematorium, and the flames spread and the shower of sparks landed down to the street, where about eighty horses were hurriedly removed. The wind seemed to increase with the fire, and the whole district was jeopardized by the flying cinders. The loss will be about a quarter of a million.

Man Who Framed Up With Burns Is All In

PHILADELPHIA, June 16.—Joseph P. O'Brien, known in the boxing world as Philadelphia Jack O'Brien, filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy today, placing his liabilities at \$100,000. His assets at \$10,000. Among his creditors are hotels, bakers, newspaper publishers, roofers, clothiers, telegraph and taxicab companies, his sister, two cousins and friends. Included in his assets is a \$10,000 endowment life insurance policy, on which he has borrowed the full cash value, \$2,750. He once had a fortune of half a million by taking his confession that he has faked in a bout with Tommy Burns—whom the public never pardoned—nearly everything he attempted proved a failure, including his "rubs," which the fans refused to patronize.
