WIFE DIES BLAMES SOVIET

BERLIN, Jan. 11-"Communism in Russia is robberism: it tolerates imprisonment, persecution and execution without trial; it has brought Russia starvation, disease and death. There is no government. It is a worse au tocracy than czaristic government and I lived for over 20 years under the czar." Mr. Schwartz, American Socialist, of San Francisco, recently re-leased from four months imprisonment in Moscow, declared today. With his wife, known 20 years in America as a socialist worker under the name of Jesse M. Molle, he went to Russia last June and attended the congress of the third internationale.

The couple were thrown into prison August 6th because they failed to approve conditions in Russia. were released December 3 after Mrs Schwartz went on a hunger strike, and sent word to Lenine, Trotzky and Tchitcherin that she preferred to have her death advertised to the working classes of America rather

than suffer further hardships.

Mrs. Schwartz died at Reval December 20 from the effects of her experiences and her husband is returning to America to give even worse pictures of conditions in Russia than many Italian, British and German delegates to the congress of the third intarnationale have painted.

"I came to Berlin and visited Mrs. Karl Liebknecht to express my sympathy with her over the death of her husband. Now I have come to see her again and tell her communist leaders in Russia have killed my wife and that I am going to America to tell Fernie, B.C. the working people the truth about the soviet government which I formerly supported."
