Detective Phair Shot by a Drunken Ruffian,

While Resisting Arrest with a "Pal" This Afternoon.

Sergeant Crawford and P. C. Birrell Pluckly Arrest Them, But Not Until After Violent

Resistance. Both Prisoners Knocked Down and Lodged in the Cells.

This afternoon Detective Harry Phair attempted to arrest two men, both the vorse for liquor, on Richmond street, oppo site St. Peter's Cathedral. One man emptied is revolver, a No. 36, firing five shots. The other fired two shots. Both men then ran away. Sergt. Crawford arrived at the spot in a private carriage, belonging to Mr. Woods.
