SERIOUS ACCIDENT AT QUEBEC.

Sixty Pilgrims Precipitated Into the River—All Saved But One.

QUEBEC, July 9.—A sad accident occurred at the Grand Trunk wharf at Lewis this evening. The inward G. T. R. train brought in about 400 passengers, all pilgrims for St. Anne de Beaupre.

At the appointed hour the pilgrims went down on the G. T. R. pontoon to watch for the St. Croix.

The weight on the slip was such, however, that as the steamer came along side the Pontoon, the latter rebounded back, breaking the slip in two.

Some 60 people were thrown into the river. All were saved, however, except a woman from Somerset, who had her arm broken in two places and got out of the water, but expired later.
