Admiration For the Japs

Pronounced the Best Part of the Allied Force

In the Recent Operations at Tien Tsin and Pekin—They Combined the Good Qualities of All the Other Contingents—
The Russian Scheme of Settlement—Counter Proposal From Germany—Britain's Attitude.

New York, Sept. 2.—Cabling from London at 6 o'clock this morning the correspondent of the Tribune says of the aspect of the Chinese situation at that hour: Actual news from China is again very meager this morning, and there is not much fresh information to be gleaned with regard to the proposed withdrawal of the allied troops from Pekin.

Military men here continue to be impressed by the reports which arrive of the conduct of the Japanese in the recent operations. The general testimony of competent witnesses who saw them at Tien Tsin is, that they were the

BEST OF ALL THE CONTINGENTS which formed the allied force there, and telegraphic accounts of their proceedings on the march to Pekin confirm the opinion as to their admirable qualities. They marched as well as the Russians; they were as doggedly persistent under fire as the American and British infantry; they had the dash of the Indian cavalry, and the unflinching officer, once famous in Indian warfare, who said: "The world has got to reckon with another great military power; Japan has a larger population than France, as much disciplined intelligence as Germany, and at least as great a natural aptitude for soldiering among her people as any European nation. In science and knowledge her general staff is second to none, and in courage, patriotism and contempt for death the rank and file of her army would certainly compare favorably with the conscript troops of the continent. Russia might overwhelm her by sheer weight of numbers, but in every other respect the Mikado's potential military force is superior to that of the czar's."

DEARTH OF PEKIN NEWS.
The continued absence of news from Pekin, the latest dispatches from the Chinese capital being now ten days old, is arousing some anxiety; but, as the country between Pekin and the coast is known to be swarming with armed bands of Boxers, it is not surprising that couriers are not able to reach Tien Tsin. Shanghai reports are to the effect that heavy French reinforcements are landing at Taku. Li Hung Chang, it is stated, has told a diplomatist that Russia, considering the mission to Pekin accomplished, has agreed to request the powers to follow her example and withdraw their troops. The French consul declares that such a request to Germany is entirely improbable.

GERMANY'S COUNTER PROPOSAL.
A special dispatch from Berlin says it is reported that Germany has rejected the Russian proposal for the withdrawal of troops and has made a counter proposal that Russia shall retire, leaving the other powers to follow their own course. According to a news agency's reports, there is not much doubt in London official circles as to the attitude of Britain.

ATTITUDE OF BRITAIN.
It is pointed out that the withdrawal from Pekin at the present moment, without a definite understanding with the Chinese Government, would be simply courting a recurrence of recent events. No understanding by Li Hung Chang would compensate for the difficulties of further negotiations, from coast. Until the powers receive a direct assurance from the Chinese government Britain is not prepared to withdraw troops. It is announced the embassy has forwarded to the foreign office a circular containing the proposal for the withdrawal of the allies from Pekin.

PRINCE CHING FOR REGENT.
St. Petersburg, Sept. 2.—The Official Messenger publishes the following dispatch dated Pekin, Aug. 30, from the Russian minister, M. De Giers: "There is an unconfirmed rumor that Prince Ching has been appointed regent, but is afraid to return here unless the foreign envoys will guarantee his liberty. Ten dignitaries remaining in Pekin have consequently resolved to petition the diplomats, to invite Prince Ching to return to Pekin and to give explanations."

BOY KILLED BY LIGHTNING.
Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 2.—On Thursday afternoon, in the Grassmore settlement, near Stonewall, while the 14-year-old son of John Carmichael was returning from school with his little sister, both were struck by lightning. The boy was killed and the girl badly stunned.

RUPTURE OF THE EUROPEAN CONCERT.
London, Sept. 2.—The publication of the text of the Russian proposals has intensified rather than diminished the suspicions entertained by England of Russia's proceedings. The rupture of the European concert is considered an accomplished fact. Opinions differ, however, as to the way in which the powers will now group themselves. Sympathizers think that Great Britain, Japan and the Triple Alliance will stand together in refusing to leave Pekin.

CHINESE LEAVING AMOY.
Hong Kong, Sept. 2.—About 50,000 Chinese are reported to have left Amoy on account of the landing of foreign troops there. The British consuls at Amoy have issued a proclamation in Chinese, reassuring the people that they will be protected by the local authorities.

The staffs of the Chinese newspapers at Canton have been released, and the papers will probably resume publication. Their suppression has produced a bad impression on the Cantonese.

Hungarian Official Estimate of the World's Crops.

CAPE TO CAIRO.
Buluwayo, Aug. 21.—Mr. Rhodes is here. The local Chronicle states that the Buluwayo and Victoria Falls Railway will be continued through the Congo Free State, and will probably be the main line.

POOR WATER IN PARIS.
Paris, Sept. 2.—The Official Medical Bulletin reveals a disquieting sanitary situation in Paris. Statistics show that typhoid fever prevails in an almost epidemic form. There were recorded from the beginning of the year to Aug. 13, 2,148 cases, of which 568 resulted fatally. This is a considerable increase over the records of previous years. Paris is never free from this disease, but until 1898 the number of cases for the corresponding period did not exceed 700. Moreover, the figures for the last few weeks of the present year show a perceptible increase over those of the earlier period. The prevalence and spread of typhoid are due entirely to bad water. One of the sources from which Paris is furnished with water is known to be infected with typhoid bacilli, though the water from all the others is perfectly pure. The authorities, however, declare that they are compelled to utilize the contaminated source because the others are inadequate. The publication of these alarming statistics may, however, spur the responsible authorities into seeking fresh sources. Meanwhile Parisians are recommended to boil the water they use or to drink only mineral waters.

WORLD'S CROPS.
Budapest, Sept. 2.—The estimate of the minister of agriculture, Dr. Ignatius De Daranyi, of the world's crops shows that the Hungarian crops have improved since the statement of July 31. The quality of wheat has improved, owing to favorable weather while the grain was ripening and during its harvest. The yield of wheat is estimated at from 4 to 5 per cent less than that of 1899, that of rye at from 22 to 23 per cent less, that of barley at from 15 to 16 per cent less, and that of oats

at from 13 to 14 per cent less. This year's world crop of wheat is estimated at \$70,000,000 to \$80,000,000 hectolitres; that of rye at 480,000,000 to 493,000,000 hectolitres; barley at 308,000,000 to 320,000,000 hectolitres; oats, 41,000,000 to 51,000,000 hectolitres, and maize, 23,000,000 to 35,000,000 hectolitres.

The average yearly consumption is estimated at: Wheat, 925,000,000 to 955,000,000 hectolitres; rye, 320,000,000 to 540,000,000 hectolitres; barley, 327,000,000 to 346,000,000 hectolitres; oats, 1,100,000,000 to 1,143,000,000 hectolitres, and maize, 981,000,000 to 1,065,000,000 hectolitres.

CAPT. HOGARTH DROWNED.
London, Sept. 1.—Capt. Malcolm Hogarth, who assisted his brother, Capt. Archie Hogarth, the skipper of Sir Thomas Lipton's yacht Shamrock, to sail that boat in the last contest for the America's cup, has been drowned at Milford Haven.

FRENCHMEN COMPLAIN.
Paris, Sept. 2.—Over 600 German officers have visited the Paris Exposition since April last, without the slightest hindrance on the part of the French authorities. There has been some bitter comment regarding the difference between the treatment of German officers visiting France and French officers desiring to revisit Alsace-Lorraine. It is admitted that every facility is afforded Frenchmen for visiting other parts of Germany. In fact, the amiable attentions of German functionaries are described as embarrassing.

SEARCH FRUITLESS.
London, Sept. 2.—The gunboat which has been searching for the missing boats with part of the crew of the wrecked British steamer Indra has returned to Aden without meeting any success. An empty boat belonging to the Indra was found ashore at Ras Aulad, and it is now believed that the occupants have been rescued by some passing vessel and are being carried to Bombay or Colombo.

WITHOUT AVAIL.
London, Sept. 1.—Before leaving England Dr. Clark Bell, of New York, gave a representative of the Associated Press a copy of the following letter, written by the late chief justice of England to Mrs. Maybrick:

"Mrs. Maybrick, June 27, 1895.
"I have been absent on circuit, hence the delay in answering your letter. I beg to assure you that I have never relaxed my efforts when a suitable opportunity offered to urge that your release ought to be granted. I feel strongly, as I have felt from the first, that you ought never to have been convicted, and this opinion I very clearly expressed to Mr. Asquith, but I am very sorry to say, hitherto without effect. Rest assured that I shall renew my representations to the incoming home secretary, whoever he may be, as soon as the government is formed, and the secretary is in a position to deal with such matters.
