DECREASE IN ATTENDANCE.

Seven Thousand Children Less in Our Schools.

Annual Report of the Minister of Education—Suggestions for Raising the Status of the Teacher.

The annual report of the minister of education for the year 1900 was pre-sented to the legislature Thursday. The statistics refer to 1899, and may

be summarized as follows: Number of public schools, 5,654, an increase of 67; Roman Catholic separate schools, 352, an increase of 7; Protestant separate schools, 8; kindergartens, 119; night schools, 16; total expenditure on public schools, \$4,-020,048; registered pupils, 429,227, a decrease of 7,500; average attendance, 243,325, a decrease of 4,455; pupils in R. C. separate schools, 41,796, an increase of 129; pupils in Protestant separate schools, 411, a decrease of 64; pupils in kindergartens, 11,262, an increase of 179; pupils in night schools, 1,026, a decrease of 478; percentage of average to total attendance in public schools, 57 teachers, men 2,612, women 5,957, total 8,569; average salary, male teachers \$394, female teachers \$294. High schools and collegiate institutes, 130; teachers therein, 568; pupils, 22,460, a decrease of 841; total expendi-

tures on high schools, \$722,239. The total school registration for the year was 471,023, and the average attendance 269.092, compared with 478,-194 and 273,451 resepectively in 1898. While the toal receipts have grown, the expenditure has also increased, and the cost per pupil in the public schools was \$9 28 in 1899, compared with \$9 19 in 1898 and \$3 67 in 1867.

They propose to bring their great experience on such large undertakings to bear upon the Ottawa navigation in the immediate future.

DELAWARE.

Delaware, March 16.—At the annual meeting of the patrons of the Delaware cheese factory, recently held, a very encouraging report was given by the secretary of the factory tary of the operations of the factory during the past year. The amount of milk sent to the factory wsa 1,085,209 pounds, producing 98,859 pounds of cheese. There was not a culled or rejected cheese during the entire season. The highest market price was invariably paid for it whenever offered for sale, and was all disposed of and patrons repaid for it whenever offered for sale, and was all disposed of, and patrons received their money early in December. The average value of milk was 7%c per 100 pounds. The average value of cheese per pound was 10.31 cents. It took 10.97 pounds of milk to make a pound of cheese. The total amount of sales was \$10,223 44. By the advice of Mr. F. Boyes, the cheesemaker, the patrons decided to lay in a stock of ice for the better preservation of the cheese during the heated term. The prospects for the coming season are good; more patrons with more milk are expected. The firm under the able management of Mr. F. Boyes, intend to carry on business in the same way as last year, and charge the same price for manufacturing cheese.
