THE PASSION FOR PLEASURE.

A London correspondent, writing in the Presbyterian Review, says: "One of the great obstacles in the way of real spiritual advance today is found in the abundant provision made for enjoyment. In this small city, with theaters, skating rinks, national and benevolent societies, Y. M. C. A. entertainments, Y. W. C. A. entertainments, church and Sabbath school gatherings, in spring, summer, autumn and winter, besides all the private gatherings that are held, one begins to wonder where there is any time left for study, meditation and sober thought. The passion for pleasure seems to be an ever-increasing tide, and although with the advent of Lent there is some slackening, even through that season it runs too high. There would seem to be room for a society that would pledge its members to stay at home some two or three nights in the week. Certainly, if there is not a reaction the young people who are growing up here will have the sweet associations that their parents have had in connection with the home of childhood."

SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING.

A special session of the city council was held yesterday afternoon to appoint an arbitrator in the case of Edward Boles, who threatens to take action against the city unless alleged damages are paid him. The damages are claimed because a sidewalk fronting Mr. Boles' property was built too high, consequently injuring the value of his land. No committee visited the place and were unable to effect a settlement, and reported that Mr. Boles asked an altogether too large amount. The mayor was given power to appoint an arbitrator on motion. Mr. Edmund Meredith was then chosen. Ald. Cooper requested that the persons who received only one item of a tender, when they intended only to take the bulk, and then declined to sign the tender, be given back their guarantee check. Some of these men, he said, wished to put in tenders for the street work, and would need the check to do so. On Ald. Beattie's motion, the matter was referred to the next Monday night. Those present were the mayor, Ald. Stevely, Jolly, Drenay, Douglas, Cooper, Gerry, Greenless, Campbell, and Secretary Bell.

NO NEW ACTS WERE REVEALED

At the Inquest on the Death of Henry St. Clair.

Nothing to Indicate That Death Was Caused by Other Than Natural Causes.

The inquest on the death of Henry St. Clair, or J. H. Hamilton, was resumed last night at the police court before Coroner MacLaren. Besides the witnesses and jury, no spectators were present. The examination of the witnesses will not be likely to terminate for some time.

It was nearly midnight when the inquest adjourned, though only three witnesses had been examined. The inquest was adjourned till Friday night next, at 9 o'clock.

Mr. J. C. Cox, proprietor of the Dominion House, who was the first witness, said St. Clair came to his house on Jan. 30 last. St. Clair told him that he had been in the city for some time. He had known him to take five or six glasses before retiring. St. Clair had been troubled with indigestion. Mr. Cox did not know the dead man's occupation. He searched his room. St. Clair always paid his board promptly, but never appeared to have any large amount of money. Witness did not know that St. Clair was in the city on the night he died. He had boarded once before, a year and a half ago, with his wife at the hotel and was there during the Duke of York's visit for two or three days. Mr. Cox, the witness, said he saw St. Clair he had never heard of St. Clair's using any drug except pepsin, which he used at every meal. St. Clair was around the hotel all morning on the day he died, and in the afternoon left the hotel with Mr. Hunter, a guest at the hotel. The next time Mr. Cox saw him was when he was sitting in a buggy in Carmichael's livery stable. He was sitting back in the buggy with his head bent forward. St. Clair had been driven home with Mr. Fred Evans, who said to Mr. Cox that St. Clair had got sick and that he had telephoned for Dr. Cox to come. Witness thought St. Clair was sleeping and did not touch him. He went out fifteen minutes after and found St. Clair in the same condition and did not wake him. He went back to his room after 7 o'clock, in his own room. He was lying on his back, and Mr. Cox felt him and found him cold and came to the conclusion that St. Clair was dead. He had given charge of St. Clair's belongings, and had found things which led him to believe that St. Clair's proper name was James H. Hamilton. Mr. Fred Evans, bartender at Mr. Cox's, took the stand next. He saw St. Clair first on the 30th of January last. He was out with the dead man on the afternoon of the 31st, and saw his portrait taken at St. Clair's request. He and Wm. Collins had left with St. Clair, when he was apparently sober, about 2:30 o'clock, and went to MacCallum's studio. They did not have anything to drink on the way to the photographer's, where they remained till 4 o'clock, when they went to the Oriental Hotel on Clarence street. Here they had one drink and left, then walked to the Hotel Normandy, Richmond street, and had two drinks. They left there at 5 o'clock and went down Richmond street to Dundas, then to Talbot, where St. Clair said he was shaky, and staggered slightly. He had become dull after leaving the Oriental Hotel. When they got to the house of St. Clair, he could not walk, and Mr. Evans telephoned for a rig. He had not heard St. Clair speak after entering the Boscwell House, and had not seen him get into the buggy. Witness stayed at the hotel, as he simply believed that St. Clair was intoxicated, and that he would be all right when he got to his room. Witness went to the Dominion House shortly afterwards and was told that St. Clair was asleep and covered with robes in the barn. Witness changed his clothes, and went to see deceased, who was in the buggy. He did not touch him. After supper next morning, witness and St. Clair, and told him to wake up, but received no answer. With the assistance of Mr. Carmichael's hostler, witness carried St. Clair to his room, and laid him on the bed. Witness touched St. Clair and found he was cold. He did not notice any sign of life. He addressed St. Clair and on feeling his heart found that the beating had stopped.

Mr. Wm. Collins, bartender, West London, who was with Evans and St. Clair, corroborated Evans' statement, in almost every detail regarding the matter.
