Ons—Ontario oats are very firm, at 31c to 31 1/2c; there is able export demand for Manitoba oats, at 28 1/2c to 29c. Barley—New No. 1 is selling at 47c to 48c; the market is firm, with quotations at 46c for No. 2, 44c for No. 3 extra, and 40c for No. 3, at outside points.

THORNDALE'S FAIR; THE BANNER YEAR

Never Such a Crowd at a West
Missouri Show—Splendid
Class of Exhibits.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Thorndale, Oct. 3.—The West Missouri Horticultural Society's Fall Fair was held yesterday in the village of Thorndale. The day was an ideal one for a show—a clear sky with just enough coolness in the air to make it pleasant to be about. The rain of Monday settled the dust and made everything look bright and clean in the village.

The villagers were astir earlier than usual, making preparations for the great annual event and to be ready to entertain their friends from a distance. A large crowd came from London, and, with the people from the surrounding country, made one of the largest crowds ever seen at the West Missouri Fair. The year 1905 so far can boast of being the banner year, as to attendance. From the Toronto and London Fairs, up to the present time, fine weather, good roads and prospects in every way, seem to all work together for the benefit of the country fairs.

The exhibits in every class at the Thorndale show were well up to the average. In heavy draught and agricultural horses there were some very fine animals indeed. In the class of West Zorra, received first prize on a well-matched team of agricultural horses, also, first on single carriage. James Bosence, East Nissouri, won first on a fine general purpose team, and James Henderson, of Belton, won first on a fine single roadster, 3 years old. The judge on heavy horses was Mr. William Mossop, Blanchard, and on light horses G. Douglas and G. A. Smith, London Township. A span of ponies exhibited by Belton Bros., Nissouri, received first money.

In cattle there was the largest exhibit ever seen at Thorndale. Sheep and hogs were also in class also. In poultry some good birds were shown, and some poor ones. B. Harcourt, carrying two-thirds of the prizes, John H. Saunders, of London, placed the awards on poultry. In the place there was a fine exhibit, especially in mangels and potatoes. The apples deserve special mention, as being the largest and finest exhibit of any small fair attended this year.

But the drawing-card on the programme was the tug-of-war between London Township and Nissouri. Race and everything else were forgotten for the time being to see this contest. There was only one pair and the winner was London Township, it taking just eleven minutes to do the trick. The men on the teams were the same as those who counted at Ilford. The greatest excitement prevailed when the ribbon was pulled over the center mark. With a little more practice Nissouri will soon be an even match for the victors.

TIMELY POINTERS TO FLOWER LOVERS

Parks Superintendent Pearce Gives Them—The Planting of Spring Bulbs.

The time for planting tulips and other bulbs is now at hand, and a few hints by Park Superintendent Pearce to the citizens on the growing of these, the loveliest of spring flowers, will not be amiss.

"Time to Plant—Now on for the next three weeks, but would not advise later. I have known good results when planted in November, but the results are uncertain."

Preparing Beds—If you want fine, rich, vigorous bloom you must have good rich soil. Nearly all bulbs like rich loam if properly applied, and their development, size, luxuriance and brilliancy depend very largely on the material the roots can draw from the soil.

If your soil is not good enough, get a load of rich clay loam. Do not dig manure into your beds, if manure is applied put it in below the bulbs, or put your manure on the top of the bed after planting. Dig your beds up thoroughly and well to the depth of one foot or more, and make soil as fine and loose as possible. When beds are not in good condition, the better way to prepare your bed will pay well for the extra trouble, and it is easily accomplished. Take off six inches of the top soil, laying to one side. Then apply the manure and dig in thoroughly, in the bottom part of the bed one-third to a half manure; level off and put back about one inch of soil. On this your bulbs and cover with a walk or driveway.

Planting—Do not plant in straight lines, nor one here and there. Have some definite plan or pattern in your mind. Plant for effect. The best and most striking results are attained by massing. Many of the bulb catalogues have one or more designs, which will give you an idea of how to arrange your beds. If you have 100 bulbs to plant, it is better to put in two effective clumps than ten small ones. Bulbs should be set in a border, a walk or driveway, and should be planted not less than four to five inches deep, and the same distance apart. Some authorities say six inches, but we would not plant over five inches; hyacinths, six to seven inches deep, and tulips, six to eight inches deep. If you plant a bed of hyacinths, plant all one variety in your bed, with a border of some other color. Mixed hyacinths don't look well, but make sure your bulbs are all set the same depth (this is very important), use a dibble about an inch and a quarter in diameter. Drive a nail through the bulb and cover with soil to the end; then shove this into the ground to the depth of the nail. Withdraw and knock away six inches, and repeat the same depth as the dibble went. Be sure and put in right side up. If the soil should be stiff and hard, remove four to five inches from the top of the bed, level nicely, and then put your bulbs on this. In that way your bulbs will be all exactly the same depth, which is very important. Cover your bed with a light dressing of well-rotted manure, and let stand all the ground freezes three or four inches deep. Then put on three or four inches of good manure, and your beds will be all right for the spring. In the spring, as soon as, or before, the bulbs show, rake off this manure, or the greater part of it. When the bulbs are coming up, or during the winter, should the weather be dry, water freely.

Varieties to Plant—I found to my surprise last spring that a few people were aware that there were two varieties of tulips—early and late blooming—knowing only the early sort. Of the two the late are probably the finest. Another important feature is that they remain in bloom much longer than the early varieties. By all means, plant a few of the late blooming and you will be pleased. I know some who only plant the late varieties. Those who saw the Bizaris and Byblossoms in Victoria Park last year can testify as to their great beauty and beautiful markings.

The following are some of the best varieties: Early single—Artus, Chrysojora, Cottage Maid, Kelskroon, La Reine, Pottebaker, white and yellow. Von Gooven.

Late or May flowering—Bizar, Byblossoms (these are beautifully marked), Gesneriana, Scarlet and white, Parrot or Dragon (petals of these are curious, fringed and cut), Darwin (a new variety that has attracted much attention at the horticultural shows in Holland, France and England).

Another little bulb that should be more generally planted is the crocus. Plant these in your lawn in some corner or side of lawn. Do not plant in rows, scatter them on the ground in an irregular manner, as if they came up of their own accord, then take a dibble, make a hole, and drop in, or raise a corner of sod with a spade and drop in.

Narcissus or Daffodils, Spanish and English Iris, are also very beautiful.

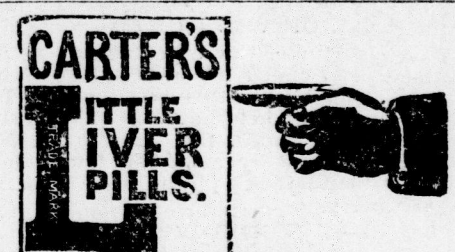
Excellent Partridge Shooting.
