Meeting Held Regarding Connection of Line With London.

The officials of the Byron Telephone Company paid a visit to Littlewood on Monday evening of the 15th inst. A meeting had been called at the schoolhouse for the purpose of seeing what could be done towards extending a telephone line from Byron to Littlewood.

When the officials of the company arrived at the schoolhouse, although a stormy night, they found a very large crowd of farmers had gathered to hear rural telephone discussed. The meeting was called to order at 8 p.m., and Mr. Jas. Cook, of the Gore road, was called to the chair. Mr. W. Baker acted as secretary.

Col. R. McEwen, president of the company; U. A. Buchner, solicitor; W. Meriam, manager, and H. Wickerson, vice-president, addressed the meeting. Col. R. McEwen pointed out the advantages of having a telephone in every farmhouse, and the comparatively low cost to each farmer; also, the great advantage of having connection with the Bell system.

Mr. W. Meriam, manager, spoke of the necessity of building lines with a view to the future development, also how the lines are extending in all directions from Byron, and that the best long-distance telephones are used, the very best material used in building the lines; also gave figures about the cost per mile.

Mr. Buchner, solicitor, stated that last year a dividend of 10 per cent was paid, and that the shares have increased in value from \$20 to \$25. The vice-president, Mr. Harry Wickerson spoke on the advantages of the telephone to the neighborhood. As this is a very rich farming section of the county of Middlesex, there is no doubt that the company's lines will extend farther south and east.

At the close of the meeting eighteen came forward and signed for telephones and shares.
The following committee was appointed to make a public canvass: Messrs. James Dale, J. W. Cook, Chas. Baker, A. McFarland, Thos. Baker and D. G. Dorcas.
It is hoped that in the near future the people of Littlewood will have telephone communication with the city of London.

GROCERS HAD MERRY TIME

Second Annual Banquet Was a Brilliant Affair.

BENEFITS OF THE ASSOCIATION

Were Brought Out in Many Speeches—The Guests Congratulate Committee.

The second annual banquet of the Retail Grocers' Association of London took place last evening in the City Hotel, and from every standpoint was one of the most successful gatherings ever held in this city. Nearly 100 prominent wholesalers and grocers, and all were unanimous in congratulating the members of the association for the excellent arrangements they had made.

The committee had worked long and hard, but they were fully satisfied with the success which crowned their efforts. It was a decided surprise to them to find that they had such excellent singers among their members, and they showed their appreciation by doubling and trebling the encores.

The splendid musical numbers, and a fine array of speeches made a programme of rare excellence.
President Shaw's Address.
"It gives me pleasure, indeed," said President Thomas Shaw, in opening his speech, to see that the grocery business is in such splendid shape, and I am glad to be able to tell you that practically every retail grocer in the city is represented here. I am pleased to be able to tell you also that the association is growing steadily."

A telegram of congratulation to the grocers was read from Messrs. Holbrook, and letters of congratulation from Messrs. Moors, Mesuret, London, and T. J. Nichols, of Owen Sound.

Mr. T. B. Escott.
President Shaw then called upon Mr. T. B. Escott.
"The travellers and retail grocers are the best company one can get among," said Mr. Escott, in replying to the toast to "Canada," "and I am glad, indeed, to be with you. Canada is a very large subject and cannot be done justice to in any short time. We have in Canada a continent of our own. We have the most natural advantages that no other country has. We have the finest waterways in the world, also the longest."

"Our natural resources are unlimited, especially in minerals. Nine-tenths of our mineral lands are as yet unexplored. Our forests are the greatest in the world, and their wealth is inexhaustible. The nations of the earth must in the future come to Canada for many of their needs. It is the duty of our Government to take every care of our natural resources. (Applause). What are we doing with our great resources? Out of 17,000,000 acres fit for wheat, only 6,000,000 are under cultivation. There is no doubt we will always be loyal to our Mother Country, but we should not be misled, will supply her with wheat. Forty-five per cent of our population are engaged in farming. This is a good sign. Our manufacturers are increasing enormously. This is another good sign. Altogether, we have a country that any one might be proud to claim as his native land." (Cheers.)

Col. A. M. Smith.
"Our Manufacturers," was responded to by Col. A. M. Smith, who stated that the mercantile interests are the most important in any country. Governments should realize that mercantile interests are not to be neglected. Commerce has always been the enricher of nations. No Canadian should move to put any clog on the wheels of trade progress with Britain."

Mr. Gilbert Nobbs.
"Our Manufacturers," was responded to by Mr. Gilbert Nobbs, who spoke briefly of the benefits to be derived by the grocers in gathering together. Canadian grocers, he thought, worked more harmoniously than those in other countries. This, he said, was due to their splendid organizations in the country. The Grocers' Association in the United States has become a national association and has 350,000 members all over the country. There are many grocers in this country who believe the division of labor is not correct. If the grocers got together and presented their case at Ottawa they could have it amended. Mr. Hueston read a motion passed by Toronto grocers favoring a provincial organization, and asking the London grocers to aid in forming it. He was pleased to see that the formation of an association had resulted in such a close union of wholesale and retail grocers."

Our Travellers.
"Our Travellers," was responded to by Messrs. Wm. Turnbull, F. E. Tobias and Jos. Boyd.

"Travelling," said Mr. Turnbull, "is an evolution of our own time. All sorts of schemes have been tried to sell goods, but it has always been found that the traveller wins out. London's grocers do not realize the importance of the grocery trade. More than a million and a half dollars' worth of trade is done in London every year. This merchandise is brought from every known land. The formation of associations cannot help being fraught with good results. Mr. F. E. Tobias spoke in a humorous vein and recited Ella Wheeler Wilcox's poem, "The Commercial Traveller."

Mr. Jos. Boyd spoke briefly.
Mayor Stevely.
"The City of London," to which I have the honor to respond," said Mayor Stevely, "is one which is dear to all of us. The grocers' association is apparently a great success, and I am pleased to tell you that the hard-ware dealers have an association and it is most successful. London's travellers make her known from coast to coast, and her products are to be found in every city in Canada."

In concluding the mayor gave many interesting figures relative to London's growth.
A Popular Member.
"I am pleased to say," said Mr. Ed. Ryan, "that we have practically every retail grocer in the city in our association. It has done much for them. They can talk over business matters with friends, and not as bitter opponents. Before we had the association we used to be constantly at war with each other. This is all changed now. There is little sense in grocers trying to undersell each other. It is no use a merchant giving away all his profits. There is room for all to do a nice business. As a rule, the man who is always giving bargains gets no one in his store but bargain-hunters." Mr. Ryan paid many compliments to President Shaw and the members of the executive for the work they have done for the association.

Growing Rapidly.
R. J. Donaghy, speaking to the same toast, said he was glad to find that the grocers' association had outgrown its present rooms and had secured larger ones. He believed in knocking down boosting. The association had secured the Wednesday closing of stores in the summer and early closing at nights. The association has directed the trade into its proper channels, and done away with much trouble. The London Grocers' Association had been directly responsible for getting Sir William Macdonald to reduce the price of tobacco. Mr. Donaghy strongly favored the formation of a provincial association.

"The Ladies" was done ample justice by Mr. Stanley Millman.
"Our Guests" was replied to briefly by Messrs. C. W. McGuire, W. McDougall and Clem Garvey.

with grief, dashed himself to pieces on the jagged cliffs below the castle.
In the long hall of the castle, the ancient parlaments of Scotland used to sit. Here they discussed the affairs of the brave and troubled kingdom, and in this great hall the doom has been passed on many an innocent man. It was in this long hall that Alexander Leslie, the covenanting general, gave a banquet to Cromwell and his covenanting lords, while about them waved the blue banner of the covenant. In the courtyard of the castle is "Moun Meg," one of the first cannon built by James IV. in 1497. "The great iron murderer muckle Meg" is the way Cromwell described it in his list. The old cannon is a prominent figure in Scotch history, and it is always spoken of as "her." Cromwell took it with him to England, but it was brought back through the intervention of Sir Walter Scott, escorted with a guard of cavalry, and all the pipers playing her in. Now, with her huge stone cannon balls beside her, she stands on the old grey ramparts, looking out across the new city to the North.

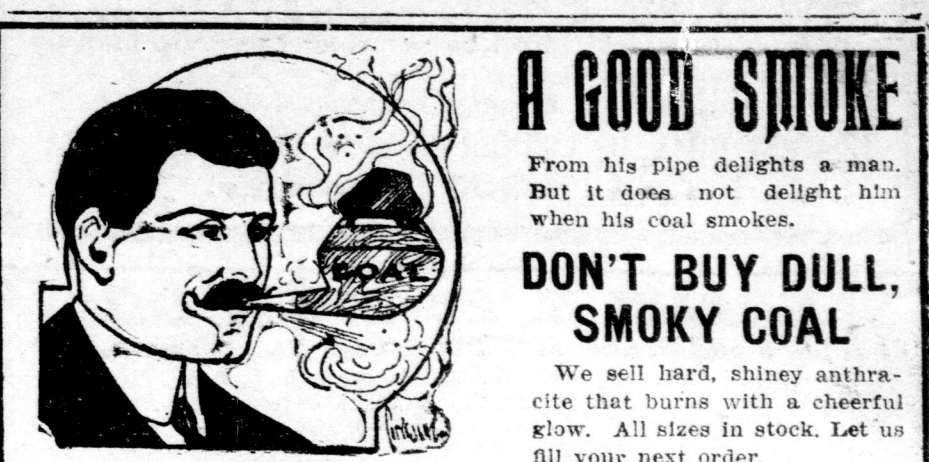
