The Bell Telephone Company's franchise expires at the end of the year.

The Independents have practically abandoned the field here, it is learned, and terms will likely be made with the Bell people.

Under the present agreement the city receives \$4,000 annually from the company. There are certain restrictions, but they are somewhat limited. The new contract will contain some new clauses, it is expected, the most important one being with reference to long-distance equipment. Some of the aldermen are in favor of cutting down the price of long-distance telephones. It is thought in some quarters that the price is too expensive.

Some Misapprehension in Regard to Drowning Accident in the Thames.

Could Not Spare Men to Drag the River and the Chief Acted as He Thought Best.

The Advertiser has received the fol

wing letter in regard to the recent

drowning accident on the Thames: It is at times interesting to draw comparisons. Last winter many emigrants living in and about the city of Toronto, most of them outside the limits, were clothed, warmed and fed by the citizens of that city, thousands of dollars worth of material being donated for the purpose, the work of relief and distribution being carried on eadership. These people had absolutely no claim-except the claim of common humanity-upon Toronto. They were not and never had been fellow-citizens, and very few were even fellow-countrymen, This week two little children, daughters of citizens of London were lost, and because their parents were summering outside the city, the London police would render no assistance to the searching parties, which went out in all directions to hunt for them. When the search proved fruitless, and it was deemed advisable to drag the river, the friends and relatives were obliged to go out in boats and fish with rakes and spiked poles to recover the tiny bodies, because it was outside the limits. Truly, London has reason to pride itself on its humanity.
