occurred when a seven-ton ladle of molten metal spilled on the floor.

AN INSANE ACT.
Kalamazoo, Mich., Aug. 18.—Mrs. Calvin Lovett, this forenoon lay down on a stick of dynamite, lit it with a hammer and was blown to pieces. Her head was torn from her body and her chest and limbs were torn into thousand pieces. The house was partly wrecked by the explosion and set on fire.

Mrs. Lovett
was released from the asylum a few months ago. She was believed to have entirely recovered and was the family desired to take her home and care for her. After her release she made a trip to Allegan, her old home, where she spent several days visiting relatives. She purchased the dynamite while waiting for a train to return to Kalamazoo.

When her husband
left home this morning Mrs. Lovett seemed to be in unusually good spirits. Neighbors saw the woman close the windows of her home just a few minutes before the explosion took place. So terrible was the shock that nearly every window in the house was wrecked.

According to the husband
the woman had never talked about suicide, although she often feared that she might be sent back to the asylum. Several children survive.

MURPHY WINS ALL COLUMBUS RACES

New York Trainer Loses But One Heat of Day at the Big Meet.

Forces Charlie Mitchell to Do Last Heat of 2:09 Trot in 2:07 3/4.

Columbus, O., Aug. 18.—The racing at the driving park this afternoon was rather tame as the race which was started for the feature did not come off, and the owners of sundry futurity colts are wondering tonight just where they are at. For years the Stock Farm Futurity has been held here and this was the race which was to furnish the entertainment this afternoon, the star three-year-old trotters being named. The boys were warmed up for the event, but when they were called for the first heat no representative of the turf appeared which promotes the event had appeared with the stake money, and the drivers and owners refused to go on with the race, announcement being made from the stand to this effect: So the battle between the colts was indefinitely postponed.

Murphy Wins Three.
The New York trainer, Tom Murphy, was the big particular star of the day, driving the winner of all three races, contested and losing but a single heat. The best race of the afternoon was the 2:09 trot in which the Murphy entry, Charlie Mitchell, was a 2 to 1 favorite over the other three. In the first heat he broke going away and although Murphy brought him very fast through the home stretch, he just barely missed reaching by a head. In the second heat, the favorite getting the decision, he was again beaten by a head. Positions were reversed in the third heat, the favorite getting the decision, and was a contender all the way, compelling Charlie Mitchell to step the heat in 2:07 3/4.
