MITCHELL RESIDENT DIES OF PARALYSIS

Mitchell, Oct. 12.—The funeral of Mrs. Christina McDonald was held this afternoon to Knox Church cemetery, and was very largely attended. Mrs. McDonald died on Tuesday after a brief illness with paralysis. She was 78 years of age, was born in Mull, Scotland, and came to Canada in 1871, settling in Georgetown, where they remained a few years. From there they moved to Bruce County and after a short stay there moved to Logan. Twenty years ago they gave up farming, and settled in Mitchell, where they have resided ever since. Deceased was a member of the Presbyterian Church. She was a woman of sterling qualities, beloved and respected by a host of friends who will deeply regret her death. PRINCIPAL RADCLIFFE DEPRECATES SLANG

London Teacher Gave an Interesting
Address at Exeter Convention.

Exeter, Oct. 12.—Principal Radcliffe of the London Normal School gave a most instructive address at the meeting of the West Huron Teachers' Association. He showed the responsibility that rests upon the teacher in correcting the language of children, many of whom are from foreign homes, where all sorts of slang is the rule rather than the exception. He urged that every effort be made to eradicate slang.

A good game of basketball was played in Exeter between Lucan and Exeter high schools, the score being 17-4 in favor of Lucan.

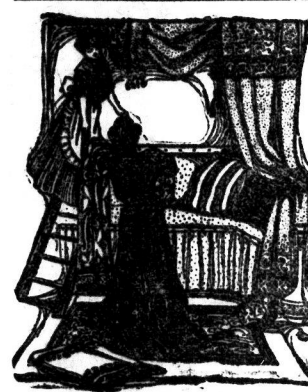

THE POLICE COURT GRIST

Colored Man Is Given Another Chance
and He Promises To Be Good.

Magistrate Judd continued his war
on obscene literature today when in
the police court he fined Wm. Mc-
Nora \$5 for having in his possession
a photograph that to say the least
was indecent. McNora was arrested
Thursday evening and charged with
being drunk, when searched at the
court the photograph was found. He
was discharged on the intoxication
charge, but the magistrate could not
overlook the other matter, so the fine
was imposed.

Wm. Melmoth, a companion of Mc-
Nora's, was charged with being
drunk, but there was also a charge of
disorderly conduct preferred against
him, when Constable Fulcher, who
made the arrests, said that Melmoth
had tried to prevent him from taking
McNora. Melmoth was fined \$2 for
obstructing the officer, and let go on
the other charge.

Will Behave.
Frank Budd, the colored gentleman
who was remanded Thursday for
being drunk.

Budd's wife appeared and stated that
he had come home drunk, and had
abused her. She had called an offi-
cer, who arrested Budd. She also stated
that Budd was a splendid husband
only for the fact that he got drunk.
When he was sober he was a steady
worker and a good provider, but drink
seemed to set him crazy and he was
not responsible for his actions. Budd
promised to behave himself in future
and not get drunk again. The magis-
trate decided to give him one more
chance and imposed a fine of \$10 or
15 days. However, he informed the
prisoner that if he should appear in
court again nothing but a term in jail
would be given him.

A Poor Aim.
Eugene Fletcher tried three times

this morning and relieved of a dol-
lar.

DETECTIVE BURNS AFTER GOMPERS

President of Federation Says
McNamara Trial Is Con-
spiracy Against Labor.

BURNS DENIES IT.

Renowned Investigator Says Evidence
Against Dynamiters Is Over-
whelming.

Cleveland, Ohio, Oct. 13.—William J.
Burns, former Government secret
service agent and detective, who worked
up the evidence in the case against
the McNamara brothers now on trial
in Los Angeles, California, last night
vigorously assailed Samuel Gompers,
president of the American Federation
of Labor.

The detective further discussed the
Ohio legislative bribery cases, and
made the statement that political in-
fluences are endangering the suc-
cessful completion of the present in-
vestigation into legislative corruption at
Columbus.

Detective Burns stopped at Cleve-
land from New York while en route
to Los Angeles, where he will remain,
he says, until after the trial of James
B. McNamara is over.

Evidence Overwhelming.
"The charge President Gompers
made in New York on Tuesday that
the case against the McNamara bro-
thers is a conspiracy against labor
is worse than asinine," said
Burns. "I say this, well knowing that
my professional reputation is at stake.
I am willing to stand or fall by the
evidence as it will be produced in the
trial. And I say that the evidence is
not complete, but overwhelming."

"It is charged by President Gompers
that the case against the McNamara
brothers is a conspiracy against labor
from Los Angeles, that the prosecution
is afraid to place J. J. McNamara, the
union official, on trial first, because

the information that the union labor

watched from his investigation. He
