## LESSONS FOR THE DOMINION

Dr. Locke's Brilliant Address to Canadian Club of London-American Educational Zeal Praised—Constructive Socialism in England - Canada Has Some Things to Learn.

Dr. Geo. H. Locke, public librarian, of Toronto, gave a most interesting address at the Canadian Club luncheon at noon today, on "Some Phases and England, and Lessons To Be Learned." There was an excellent attendance of the members, and all thoroughly enjoyed the lecture. Capt. T. J. Murphy presided.

In his opening remarks Dr. Locke gave a most interesting talk on books, Lord Rosebery stated in a recent speech that a library was a place of dead books—that it made one feel as if he were in a cemetery. This viewpoint was criticised by Dr. Locke, who stated that it was often better to be in the company of books that appeared dead than in company with some people, who, while they looked alive, were really dead.

It was difficult to judge what was really worth while, and books that apreally worth while, and books that appeared to be dead, covered with the dust of ages, would be of great assistance in solving a problem for some berson.

The Best That Had Lived.

In books one met the best that had latk with them, make their acquainting and enjoy their company. Ottawa, Nov. 17.—What has been done to better the Canadian militia and what remains to be done was discussed before the conference of officers this morning by eGeneral Colon MacKensle, chief of staff. He stated that the militia was designed to be a fighting machine, and to be ready for effective service whenever called upon. The secret of efficiency was organization. It was organization alone which enabled the Germans to beat the French in 1579, and the Japanese to heat the Russians more recently. The imperial conference had arranged for uniform training of militia throughout the empire, and he was glad to be able to say that in the achievement of this plan Canada had taken the lead over any other colony. The Canadian militia had been reported upon by General French, who had declared that the chief weakness lay in the fact that the peace organization was not designed for effective, active work. Since that time there had been corrections made. The militia had been divided into divisions, and within a short time the work of the reorganization would reach a point where any or all of these divisions could be immediately mobolized in time of war for effective work.

A Healthy Growth.

There was a healthy growth of the militiar in Canada, as evidenced by several offers to organize new military units. The training figures showed

The gates were suddenly opened and a large number of captured Manchus were dragged out by their hair, beheaded and their heads hurled at the feet of the delegates.
