now drawing to a conclusion, matters of considerable moment have been under consideration. The opportunities perial defence committee have been

truitful of invaluable information upon matters considered and determined by that committee. His majesty's ministers have received us most cordially. We have had the advantage of discussing with mutual frankness questions of great importance not only to Canada, but to the whole empire. Among the most important objects of our visit was the desire to obtain information respecting conditions of naval defence affecting the empire. The stress of the present session of Parliament, now adjourned, and other unavoidable causes has prevented us from receiving full information in its final form, but we expect it will reach us very shortly after our return to Canada, and with no unnecessary delay it will then be considered




