

STORY OF THE LIFE OF WOODROW WILSON IN TABLOID

1856—Born at Staunton, Va., to Joseph R. Wilson, a Presbyterian minister, and Janet Woodrow Wilson, his wife.
1858—Taken to Augusta, Ga., by parents.
1858-70—Spent boyhood and began school at Augusta.
1870-72—Lived with parents and attended school at Columbia, S. C.
1872-74—Attended school at Davidson College, Davidson, S. C.
1874-75—Lived with parents at Wilmington, N. C.
1875-79—Attended Princeton University and was graduated therefrom. Established reputation as debater and writer on political economy.
1879-80—Took law course at University of Virginia, Charlottesville. Extended fame as debater. Won writers' and orators' prizes.
1881-83—Practiced law at Atlanta, Ga.
1883-85—Took course in history and political economy at Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore.
1885—At Savannah, Ga., married Miss Ellen Louise Axson, daughter of Presbyterian clergyman of Georgia.
1885-88—Taught political economy and history at Bryn Mawr.
1888-90—Was professor of history and political economy at Wesleyan University, Middletown, Conn.
1890-1902—Was professor of jurisprudence and politics at Princeton University.
1902—Elected president of Princeton.
1902-10—As head of Princeton, attempted and partially succeeded in democratizing university.
1910—Became involved in controversy with Princeton trustees over efforts to democratize college, was overruled and resigned.
1910—Elected governor of New Jersey. Led fight which ousted bipartisan machine and restored popular government.
1912—July 2, nominated for president by Democratic national convention at Baltimore.
1912—Nov. 5, elected President of United States.

Champ Clark, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Was Re-elected.

HEAVY WOMEN'S VOTE

In California the Women Came Out Strong for the Progressives.

New York, Nov. 5.—One of the interesting features of election day was the part taken by the women in their first presidential election. In Los Angeles the vote of the women was extraordinarily heavy, and was heavily Progressive. In San Francisco there were many women clerks of election, and in one district eighty women did picket duty to prevent the election of Wolf for state senator and the constitutional amendment permitting the re-establishment of race tracks which Wolf espoused.

Uncle Joe Cannon, who has represented the eighteenth Illinois district since the memory of man runneth not to the contrary, has gone down to defeat in the election.

Roosevelt carried Chicago over Wilson by about 20,000.

Col. Roosevelt carried Oyster Bay, his home town, by a plurality of 292 over Woodrow Wilson.

Wilson's majority in Indianapolis over Roosevelt was 2,314, and Taft was 300 behind the latter.

Wilson's plurality in Baltimore is 20,000, in Hartford, Conn., 2,000, in Niagara Falls, N. Y., about 2,000, and in Rochester 1200.

Syracuse Democratic.

For the first time in its history Syracuse N. Y., has gone Democratic, Wilson carrying it by more than 1,000 plurality.

Incomplete returns indicate beyond a doubt that Champ Clark, speaker of the House, has been re-elected to Congress, from Montgomery (Missouri) for the ninth time.

Philadelphia gave Taft a vote equal to the combined vote of Wilson and Roosevelt.

Wilson carried Cleveland by 8,000. Incomplete official returns place Roosevelt second.

In Grand Rapids (Michigan) Roosevelt polled as many votes as Taft and Wilson.

The Socialists claim the three Congressmen from Allegheny County, Pennsylvania—Congressman Victor L. Berger, of Milwaukee, the only Socialist in the present Congress, was defeated for re-election.

The city of New York, with thirty-seven election districts missing, gives the following vote: Wilson 305,283, Taft 124,482, Roosevelt 184,516.

Mrs. Wm. H. Taft, wife of President Taft, with her daughter, Miss Helen Taft, were the guests of National Chairman Hilles, of the Republican national committee, at his New York headquarters, where the returns were received tonight.

Senator Jos. M. Dixon, chairman of the national Progressive committee, with Governor Hiram W. Johnson, the vice-presidential nominee of the Progressive party, and Mrs. Johnson, heard the returns at the new party's headquarters tonight.

WILSON'S ELECTION PLEASES ENGLISH

London Evening Papers All Speak Highly of President-Elect.

RESULT WAS EXPECTED

Pail Mail Gazette Says Americans Are Determined to Have More Honest Government.

[Canadian Press.] London, Nov. 6.—The presidential election resulted much as had been anticipated in Great Britain, although the public was prepared for the possibility of none of the candidates obtaining sufficient votes and of the choice of a president being thrown into the hands of Congress.

The evening newspapers today all speak very highly of Woodrow Wilson and of his policies and politics. The free trade Westminster Gazette says the people of the United States are clearly ripe for new men and new measures. It concludes:

"The United States thus joins in the universal movement against the artificial raising of prices by a tariff."

The Evening Standard says: "Woodrow Wilson's election is a confidence in his own country and in the world outside. He is a public man of a much higher type than some of those who have occupied the White House. The Democrats did a good stroke of business for their party when they chose him." It continues: "They had the sense to see that the great majority of respectable citizens of the United States were heartily tired of the sordid squabbles of party managers with the accompanying chicanery, intrigue and self-seeking."

The Pail Mail Gazette says Woodrow Wilson is the type of citizen whose aloofness from politics has left American affairs to become so largely the prey of corruption and chicanery. It continues: "The promotion of Woodrow Wilson to the Democratic leadership and the election of Theodore Roosevelt as the head of a new party, are in reality two symptoms of the same force—it is the wish of the better elements in America for the blessings of honest government. It is a sign of health in the nation that the real contest should be between two men who are so much superior in character and outlook to the common political level."

TAFT WILL RESUME HIS LAW PRACTICE

President Will Return to Cincinnati Next March—Smiled as He Heard Returns.

Cincinnati, Ohio, Nov. 5.—In the same house where he heard the news of his victory over William J. Bryan, four years ago, President Taft tonight read the bulletins that told the story of the election. Four years ago Mrs. Taft, Miss Della Torrey, of Milbury, Mass., his favorite aunt, and Mrs. Alice Roosevelt Longworth, were present to hear the news. Tonight the President and C. P. Taft and Mrs. Charles Anderson, Mrs. Taft's sister, were the only members of the family present, but a few friends dropped in during the evening.

The President was cheerful and smiling, and apparently was under less strain than other members of the family dinner party at the home of his brother, C. P. Taft.

The President, who shortly before noon today, spent a few minutes at Prosperity League headquarters, and then returned to his home.

The report that Mr. Taft might consent to become the nominee of his party four years from now in case of present defeat was put aside by his friends as too far ahead for serious consideration.

Mr. Taft has many times declared his intention of returning to Cincinnati and resuming the practice of law if defeated, and that intention was said tonight not to have been altered.

N. Y. PLURALITY ESTIMATED 150,000

Sulzer Elected Governor and Martin Glynn Lieutenant-Governor.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Nov. 5.—New York State went Democratic in practically every branch of its government. Congressman Wm. Sulzer was elected governor, and Martin H. Glynn, lieutenant-governor, by a plurality estimated at 150,000 over the nearest opponent, Job Hedges, the Republican candidate.

With returns fairly well known this morning, Oscar Straus, the Progressive candidate, announced that he had received third place in the extent of the popular vote received. The legislature will be strongly Democratic in both branches, according to indications early today.

Congressman Sulzer received a plurality of the popular vote cast, not only in the Democratic strongholds of New York city, but in the "up-state" districts, where Henry L. Stimson, Republican candidate, polled a majority of votes in his fight against John A. Dix, the present governor, in 1910. These totals in New York city were:

Sulzer 303,741, Straus 193,572, Hedges 111,050.

Taft Carries Idaho. Boise, Idaho, Nov. 6.—Returns this morning show that Taft has carried the state by 8,000 and that the legislature will be safely Republican on joint ballot, thus assuring the election of two Republican United States senators.

Massachusetts. Boston, Mass., Nov. 6.—The magnitude of the Democratic victory in Massachusetts' election yesterday for the leaders of the national and state ticket has become more apparent today with additional and revised returns.

These returns gave, in 1912, out of 1,102 precincts:

President—Wilson 165,264, Taft 46,943, Roosevelt 134,731.
Governor—Foss 186,212, Walker 138,592, Birge 119,095.

Massachusetts' delegation to the lower branch of Congress will stand nine Republicans and seven Democrats.

The Republicans will have a sufficient working majority on a ballot of the next legislature to choose Senator W. Murray Crane's successor.

Maine's Returns. Portland, Me., Nov. 6.—For the first time in its history Maine will send six Democratic electors to the national electoral college, according to today's revised returns from yesterday's election. With fifty election precincts missing, the vote was:

Wilson 59,164, Roosevelt 48,192, Taft 26,125.

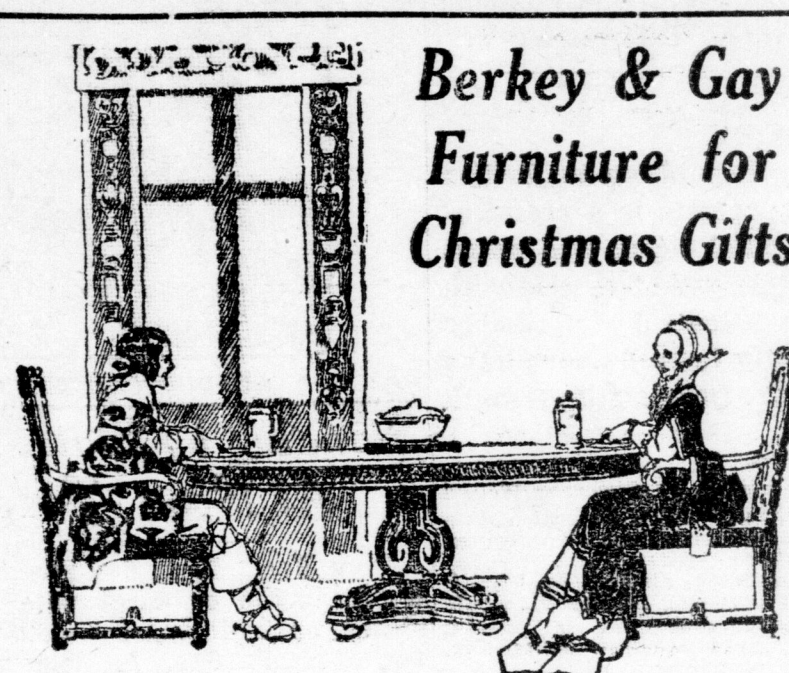

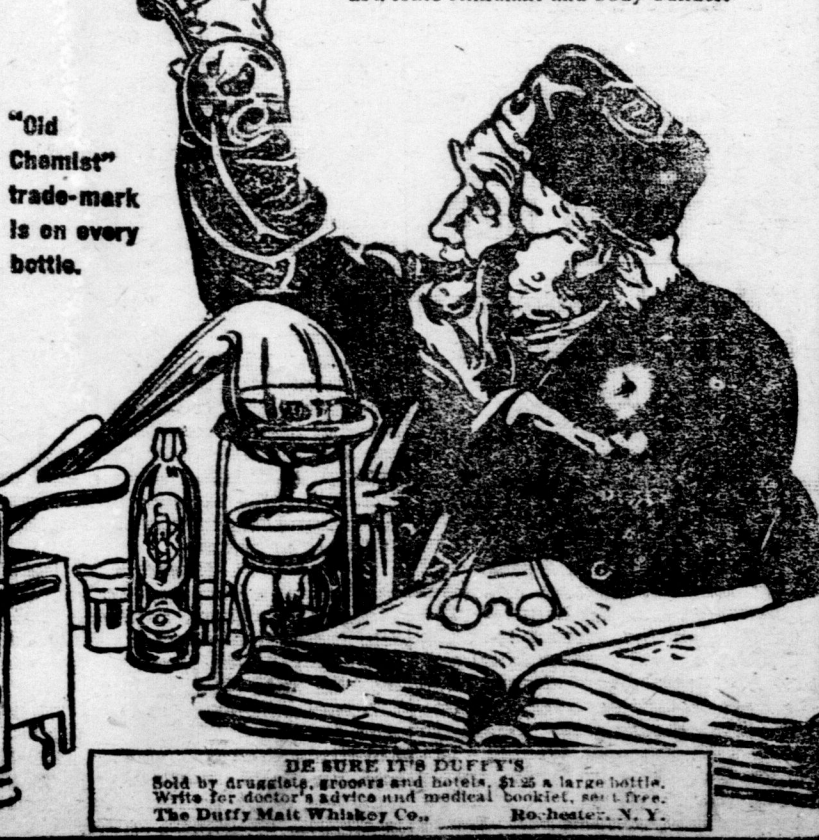
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AMUSEMENTS
