# A BYLAW

# To Prohibit the Sale by Retail of Spirituous Fermented or Other Manufactured Liquors in the Municipality of the Township of London

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of London neredy enacts as follows:

1. THAT the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors is and shall be prohibited in every tavern, inn or other house or place of public entertainment in the said Municipality, and the sale thereof except by wholesale is and shall be prohibited in every shop and place other than a house of public entertainment in the said Municipality.

2. THAT the votes of the electors of the Township of London entitled to vote on this Bylaw will be taken on this Bylaw by the Deputy Returning Officers hereinafter named, on Monday, the sixth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, commencing at nine o'clock in the morning, and continuing until five o'clock in the afternoon at the under-mentioned places:
