

ART WARNER ACCEPTS OFFER OF "KID" ZOCCANO FOR BOUT

Mr. Arthur Warner, of 427 Wellington street, will consent to box an exhibition bout with "Kid" Zoccano on the terms mentioned in last evening's Advertiser. The bout will be an exhibition one, the proceeds to go to the Archie Pined fund, and the date will be arranged by the boxers, if Zoccano decides to take on Warner. There is not much doubt about the boys getting together, and the affair should prove an interesting one.

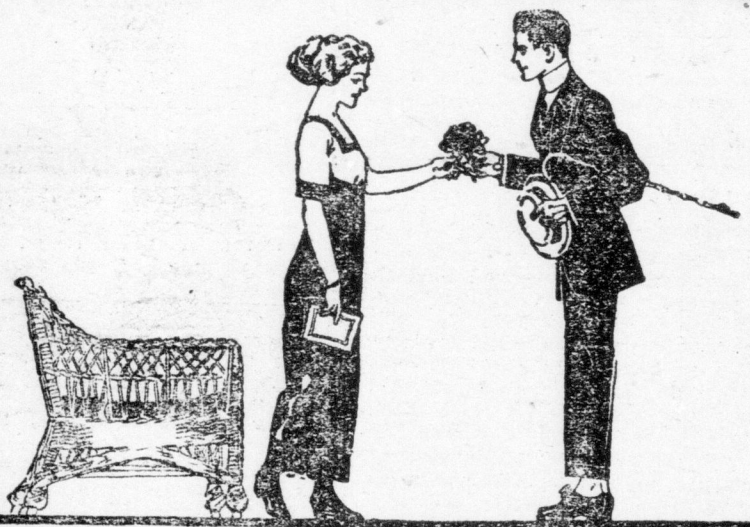

Hamilton, May 31.—In order to get down to the salary limit there will have to be several changes made in the Hamilton Canadian League team, but Secretary Robinson said tonight that he was not in a position to say just what would be done. The club is carrying seventeen players, and it is expected that two more will be released. Manager Schaefer, first baseman, and Garlow, pitcher, will be let out. The changes must be made tomorrow.

Rube Deane, manager of the Berlin team, says that he does not need to make any changes to keep within the rules of the league.

Umpire Johnson looks like a good umpire, and outside of the decisions that Manager Needham and Powell kicked upon, he was all right.

Jacobson can certainly nab runners at first. He caught Brant and Bierbauer nicely yesterday, neither one having a chance to get back to the bag in time.

Cocash has played against Jacobson before, and he was right onto the port-side's throw to first. He took a bigger lead than any of them, but again got back ahead of the ball.

If Hynes had not touched the ball when Bierbauer threw to catch Jacobson at the plate, it is doubtful if St. Thomas would have scored at all.

Yesterday's game demonstrated that the Tecumsehs are never out of it until the last ball is thrown. Their ability to win out in the final inning has been tested several times this season.

Nichols is playing a great game at third base and his work at the bat is also looking up. Powers' liner to him in the first was a screamer, and it looked like suicide to try to stop it. Even at that "Nix" went after it and nearly got it.

All the Canadian League teams are releasing players today in order to get within the salary limit. Although Manager Needham has not given an official announcement of what he intends doing, it is likely that Rudolf will be given his release. There was some talk about Cunningham and Reske going too, but this has not been confirmed. Any of these players could make good on the other teams in the league.

Powers is the big nose in the hitting line on the Saints' line-up, and he can be depended upon to bring it hard when men are on bases. He is a member of the best catcher in the league. He worked in the outfield yesterday and did well, his catch of Speer's fly being spectacular.

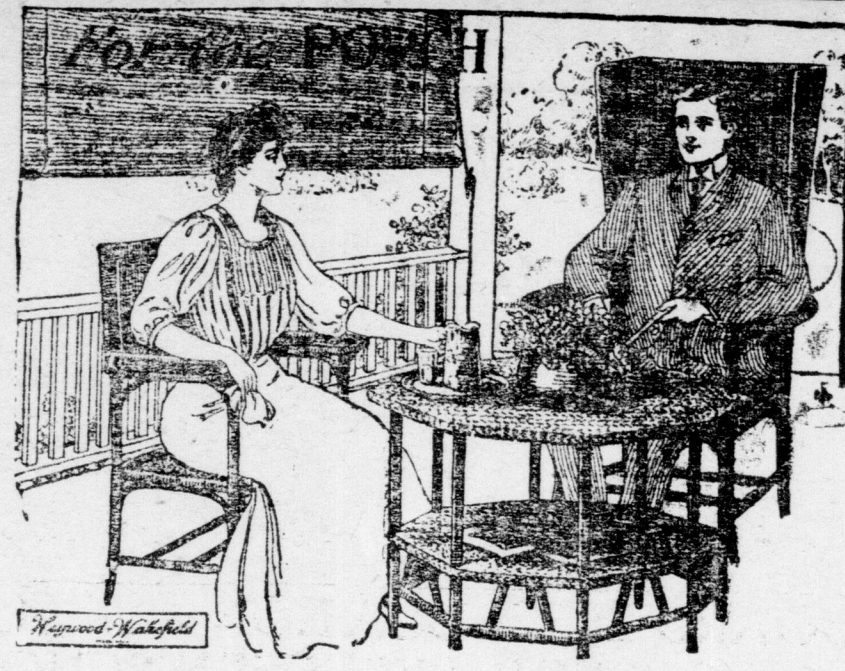
Best Marathoner in America



Mike Ryan, winner of the Boston Marathon this year, is a veteran long distance runner. He is a member of the Irish-American A. C. of New York, and when he broke the tape in Boston established a new record of 2:21:18 1-2 for the course, despite the mud and water that made the course five minutes slow, in the opinion of experienced runners. Ryan is the choice of the field of Marathon runners, who will represent the United States in an effort to duplicate John Hayes' victory in 1905.

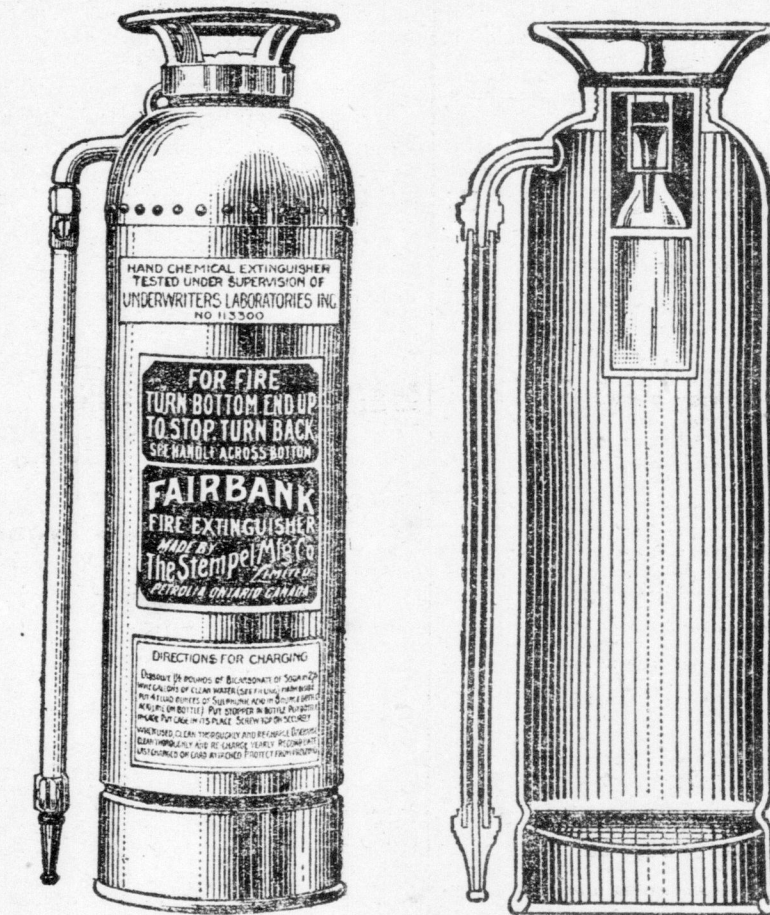
