IN NEW ZEALAND WEATHER'S BALMY ALL YEAR THROUGH

Miss Anderson-Hughes Gives
Description of Beauties of
Native Land.

Maoris Taking Advantage of
Educational Facilities and Sit-
ting in Parliament.

To a largely-attended meeting of the
Woman's Canadian Club held Thursday
afternoon in the Normal School, Miss
Anderson-Hughes, of New Zealand,
gave a most descriptive address about
the beauties of her native land, which
she referred to as being "weird, wild,
and wonderful—a land where it is al-
ways springtime." Miss Anderson-
Hughes illustrated her address with
coloured slides, which cor-
roborated fully her claims of beauty for
New Zealand.

The speaker gave an interesting
sketch of the original discovery of the
island some 400 years ago by a Maori
warrior chief from Hawaii, who with
a band of men set forth on a voyage
of discovery in open canoes. After
many days' travel they reached the
shore of the island, and in time their whole
tribe settled there. At the present time
there were about 50,000 Maoris in New
Zealand.

Balmy All the Year.
Regarding the climate of the coun-
try, Miss Anderson-Hughes stated that
it was balmy the year round, with out
a few weeks of cold weather, and prac-
tically no snow. The mountains, how-
ever, were covered with snow all the
time, and it is possible to keep three
cows upon one acre of land, the vege-
tation is so luxuriant. Both the vege-
tation and animal life were entirely dif-
ferent from that of any other country,
the speaker said.

"One difference is that in the old
world, for instance, you can never for-
get that you are in lands that have
been peopled for thousands of years.
Traces of man are found everywhere.
But in New Zealand you can get away
into the interior where for hundreds
of miles nothing is seen but the most
beautiful of semi-tropical scenery in
its original wild state, and nothing
heard but the warbling of the thou-
sands of song-birds that dwell in the
forests."

Hugh Fern Trees.
The pictures included some most pic-
turesque river scenes, showing the
huge fern trees for which New Zea-
land is noted, rugged mountain scenery,
and the hot springs which abound in
the north island.

Regarding the Maoris, Miss Ander-
son-Hughes stated that they were a
fine race of people, eager to cultivate
the arts, and take advantage of educa-
tion. A number of the best doctors in
New Zealand were natives who had
been graduates from Edinburgh, and
five of the members of parliament of
New Zealand were also Maoris.

In many parts of the island prohibi-
tion is in force, and this by the vote
of the natives themselves.

PIT DEATH LIST OVER HUNDRED

Thirty-Three Additional Bodies
Have Been Brought to
Surface.

CRUSHED BY ROCKS
Preparations Being Made to Care for
the Widows and Orphans.

Pittsburg, April 25.—Rescue parties,
working in the Cincinnati mine of the
Pittsburgh Coal Company, where an
explosion occurred Wednesday after-
noon, this morning brought thirty-
three additional bodies to the mouth
of the slope. These were placed on a
special train and taken to Monongahela
City, where, like the 18 recovered yester-
day, they were prepared for burial.
Ten additional names were added to
the missing during the night, and while
no official statement of the dead has
been given out by the company, the
loss of life is placed by the men at
the mine at 115.

Havoc Everywhere.
As the force from the Bureau of
Mines, supplemented by trained min-
ers from the district, penetrated fur-
ther into the works during the night
they were able to ascertain the extent
of the damage. Whole entries were
choked with fallen rock, the draining
system was completely out of commis-
sion, and havoc was apparent in every
part of the workings they were able
to reach.

The bodies recovered were found
buried under the fallen roof, and the
opinion was expressed by some of the
men that all bodies that will be recov-
ered later will be found under masses
of fallen rock. It may, therefore, be
several days before the exact extent
of the loss can be determined. The
force of workers was increased this
morning by volunteers from the dis-
trict, the air having been advanced to
a point where men not supplied with
the rescue equipment could be used to
advantage. However, some parts of
the mine are still filled with gas and
until these are cleared no one can
enter.

Identification of bodies proceeded at
the temporary morgue in Monongahela
City, to which all bodies were taken
when removed from the workings.
Many of them were so mangled that
it was feared they could never be
identified. Preparations for the care
of widows and orphans, made so by
the explosion are under way, and for
the present they are being looked after
by agents of the coal company.

TRIED TO RESCUE BODY.
Edmonton, Alberta, April 25.—Details
of the tragedy show that on the occasion
of the shooting of Detective Bailey on
Wednesday, Whitley endeavored to re-
scue the body from in front of the shack,
but he too was shot in the thigh. Tetley
and Stead between them dragged Whitley
out of range of the murderous rifle fire.
Then Tetley wanted to return and bring
Bailey's body away. He tried twice, but
the hail of shot became so furious he was
forced to retire. It was suicide to go
near the outlaw's stronghold, but true to
the traditions of the "riders of the
plains," "Bailey may only be uncon-
scious," he argued. Then a bullet struck
him in the hand and his companion, Stead,
drew him away. Bailey's body was re-
covered later.

BAPTIST LADIES AT MISSIONARY MEETINGS

Addresses of Prominent Work-
ers Heard by Large
Audiences.

Mrs. Gordon Wright and Mrs. (Rev.)
Hawkins were the speakers Thursday
afternoon at a union missionary meeting
of the Ladies' Missionary Societies con-
ducted with the various Baptist churches
of this city, held in Talbot Street Baptist
Church. Mrs. Hawkins spoke of the
responsibility and opportunity of women
in missionary work, pointing out that
the time was ripe for earnest and in-
creased effort. Mrs. Wright described
the work being done by the W. C. T. U.
among the lumbermen in various parts
of Canada. Both addresses were much
appreciated. Musical numbers were given
by Messdames Arthur Brown, Rickard and
Leach during the afternoon.

Supper, for 200.
At 6 o'clock the meeting adjourned to
the basement, where an excellent supper
was served to about 200 guests by the
ladies of the Talbot Street Church. Miss
Anderson-Hughes, of New Zealand, world
representative of the W. C. T. U., was
present with Mrs. Wright, and following
the repeat gave an informal talk on the
union's work in New Zealand, also speak-
ing of the excellent work being done
there by the Baptist missionaries. She
commended highly the efforts of the wo-
men's missionary societies in the
churches.

The evening session was called to order
at 8 o'clock, and after devotional exer-
cises, Mrs. (Rev.) C. M. Mitchell, a mis-
sionary on furlough from Bolivia, and
whose husband has just returned to that
country, gave a most helpful address,
speaking of the social, commercial,
political and religious life of the people.
Liberty for Bolivia.

She emphasized the fact that religious
liberty had recently been granted to the
people of Bolivia, and the Protestants
could now hold out-door meetings on the
plazas of the different cities. The
prospects were very bright for Protestant
work, as the people were breaking away
from the tyranny of Catholicism, which
is much corrupted in that land. Their
religion, however, depended
entirely upon missionary effort of the
Protestant churches.

During the evening musical selections
were given by the choir, and Misses El-
cott and Shorthorn sang excellent solos.
The attendance at both sessions was
large. Mrs. (Rev.) Bingham presided in
the afternoon, and Mr. Bingham at the
evening gathering.
