

THREE MEN KILLED THREE BADLY HURT IN BIG EXPLOSION

Dynamite Blew Up Prematurely
When Gunpowder Was Put
in a Hot Drill.

Victims Were Blasting for New
C. P. R. Line Near
Belleville.

Belleville, May 26.—Three men were killed and three injured, two probably fatally, by the premature explosion of a dynamite blast in a Canadian Pacific Railway construction camp four miles from here at noon today. It is said that the explosion resulted from the detonation of a quantity of gunpowder which had been placed, as a fuse, in a hole which was still hot from drilling.

The dead:—

John H. McLean, foreman, Antigonish, N. B.

A. Holland, powder helper, Cornwall, Ont.

D. Armistead, Italian laborer, Toronto, Ont.

The injured are Thomas McKinnon, locomotive engineer; M. Andrea, Italian laborer, and Harry Wake, brakeman. Little hope is entertained for McKinnon's recovery, and Andrea's condition is decidedly critical.

The victims were members of a gang employed by the Dominion Construction Company, engaged in preliminary right-of-way work for the Canadian Pacific's new shore line through this city. They had prepared a hole for blasting in a deep rock cut, and it is alleged that powder was poured into the hole before it had sufficiently cooled. A detonation immediately followed, involving the explosion of a large quantity of dynamite which lay close by.

Such was the force of the blast that bits of the bodies of the victims were found over a hundred yards from the spot. The two railwaymen who were injured were on a construction train near the scene of the explosion. McKinnon was blown from the cab of his engine.

The injured were removed to the hospital here, where every effort is being made to save their lives. An inquest was commenced tonight before Coroner Dr. Boyce.

HEAD-ON COLLISION.

Elmira, N. Y., May 26.—In a head-on collision of two freight trains on the Pittsburgh, Shawmut and Northern Railroad, two miles east of Angeleno, today Engineer George Cooper, of Hornell, was killed instantly, and Engineer Pitzer, of St. Marys, Pa., was fatally injured.

NEW SENATORS NAMED TO FILL FOUR VACANCIES

Two Anglicans and Two Roman
Catholics—One Is a Mem-
ber of the House.

Col. James Mason, Alex. Mc-
Call, E. D. Smith, and J. J.
Donnelly Chosen.

Ottawa, May 26.—The four Ontario vacancies in the Senate were filled today. The new men are: Col. James Mason, of Toronto, president of the Home Bank; E. D. Smith, of Winona, former member for Wentworth; J. J. Donnelly, the sitting member for South Bruce; Alex. McCall, of Simcoe, former member for Norfolk.

Col. James Mason, of Toronto, has had a long experience in business affairs, and is recognized as an authority on banking and financial matters. He is president of the Home Bank of Toronto, which has been built up to its present high position largely through his efforts. He is also a director of several important companies. He is also widely known in connection with military affairs, and served in the Northwest Rebellion in 1885, and was severely wounded at Datcha. At the Diamond Jubilee in 1897, he was second in command of the whole colonial infantry drawn from all parts of the Empire. Col. Mason is a member of the Roman Catholic Church.

A Former Member.

Mr. E. D. Smith was a member of the House of Commons from 1900 to 1908, representing the County of Wentworth. He is a well known agriculturalist and fruit grower of Ontario. While a member of the House of Commons he took a commanding position, and was recognized as one of the most important members of the Liberal-Conservative party then in opposition. He will bring to the Senate a wide experience in public matters and a comprehensive knowledge of the industries with which he has been associated for so many years. Mr. Smith is a ready speaker, and will be a strong acquisition to the debating power of the Senate. He is a member of the Anglican Church.

Alex. McCall.

Alexander McCall, of Simcoe, is a well known lumberman, and has been engaged in mercantile operations for a number of years. He represented the County of Norfolk from 1908 to 1911, and is well known throughout the western portion of Ontario. He is a man of high character and excellent business ability. He is a member of the Anglican Church.

James J. Donnelly, member for South Bruce, represented that constituency in the House of Commons

from a by-election in 1904 until the general election of that year, when he was defeated. In 1908 he was elected, and the general election of 1911 he was again elected. He is a practical farmer with wide experience. He is a member of the Roman Catholic Church.

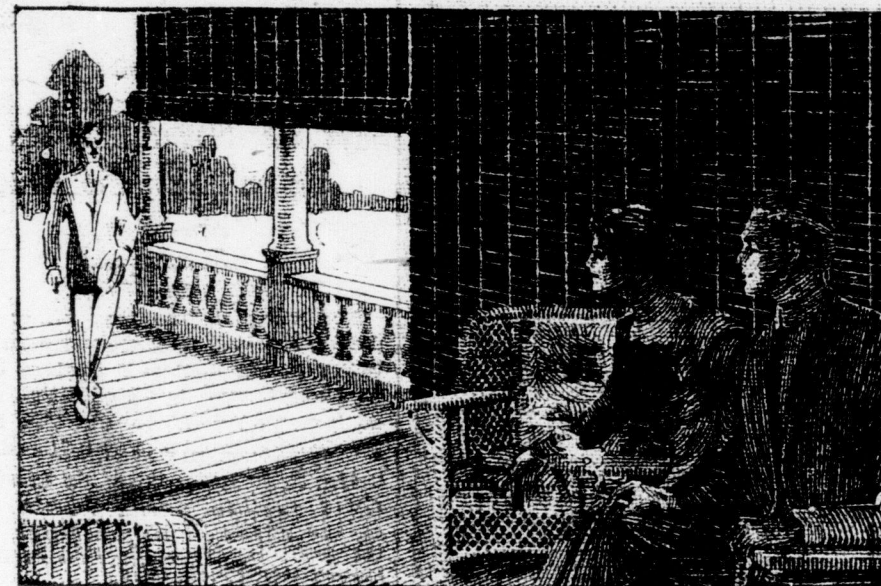
