WHITEHALL RAIDED BY BANDS OF SUFFRAGETTES

Hundreds of Windows Smashed and Postoffice Mail Boxes
Again Attacked—An Attempt Made to Interview
Chancellor Lloyd George.

London, Jan. 28.—As a protest against the withdrawal of the franchise bill by the Government, the suffragettes resumed their militant tactics tonight. While a deputation, which the Chancellor of the Exchequer, David Lloyd George, had refused to see until tomorrow morning, were trying to force their way into Parliament against an overwhelming force of police, and were being placed under arrest for resisting the officers, other bands of women went through Whitehall breaking the windows of the Government offices and through Cockspur street, where the great plate-glass windows in the establishments of shipping companies were ruthlessly smashed.

Attacked Mail Boxes.
The women also visited Oxford, Regent and other streets in the shopping district, where similar damage was done. Later post boxes were attacked, quantities of liquid being poured into them.

In the outlying suburbs, too, the suffragettes took steps to bring the cause before the public by damaging property.

Twenty-one women were arrested in the vicinity of the Parliament Buildings, but were allowed out on bail after the House rose.

Most of the police stations had one or more prisoners charged with destroying property.

Wild Excitement.
The demonstration in Whitehall was not so large as some of those previously held, the force of police and a drenching rain militating against any great turnout. The greatest excitement prevailed, however, and besides protecting property and arresting the women who engaged in window smashing, or refused to move on when ordered, the police had the greatest difficulty in protecting the women from an unruly crowd of youths who gathered and hustled every woman wearing the suffragist colors.

In several cases the women were roughly handled. An attempt to duck four of them in the fountain in Trafalgar Square was frustrated by a police posse which had to use clubs on the crowd.

Answer to "Treachery."
The entire deputation of 21 women, who attempted to make their way into the House of Commons to interview Chancellor Lloyd George, were arrested. The prisoners included Mrs. Drummond and Sylvia Pankhurst, who marched in front. Before starting on their mission the delegates listened to addresses by Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst and other leaders.

Mrs. Pankhurst said that the withdrawal of the franchise bill, including the speaker's ruling, was a plot decided on long ago, and Premier Asquith was aware of it.

"The answer to this treachery," she declared, "is militancy."

Sylvia Pankhurst said that their intention was to hold the speaker in the chair and leave Mr. Asquith on the bench, and with this the deputation started. The police gave them safe escort as far as the entrance of Parliament, where an inspector informed them that the Chancellor of the Exchequer would be unable to see them until morning.

Tombfoolery.
Mrs. Drummond retorted: "This is tombfoolery. If you don't let us in there will be trouble."

At that the members of the deputation threw themselves at the police, who stood six deep across the entrance, and a scuffle occurred, in which Mrs. Drummond and another

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The crowd showed little sympathy for the suffragettes, whom they tried to jostle as they were being led to the station by the police. The authorities, it is understood, contemplate arresting the leaders for inciting their followers to break the laws.

Christobel at Helm.
Christobel Pankhurst, who is often referred to as the brains of the organization, is believed to be in London directing the demonstrations. She is known to have left Paris, where she had been living since a warrant for her arrest was issued at the time her mother, Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, was convicted, and all trace of her is lost.

The damage to property tonight would have been much greater had not the shopkeepers taken the precaution to board up their windows.

Mrs. Despard, one of the most prominent leaders of the militant suffragettes, and two of her companions, were sentenced to fourteen days' imprisonment today on the charge of resisting the police in the execution of their duty when they dispersed a meeting in Trafalgar Square last evening.

Mrs. Despard, who is a sister of Sir John French, was offered the option of paying a fine of \$10, but she refused to accept this, and was sent to jail.

According to a dispatch from Dublin the suffragettes made a concerted attack on Dublin Castle at noon today and wrecked many windows. There were several arrests.

SUGGESTS BOARD TO MAKE RATES
May Be Federal Commission to Take Charge of Workmen's Compensation.

FORECAST OF THE BILL
The Act Will Not at First Include the Employers of Labor.

Toronto, Jan. 28.—What could be considered as a workmen's compensation round table talk took place at the Parliament Buildings last night, when Sir William Meredith held his last session before resigning his report to the Provincial Government.

"I won't recommend that every employer shall be brought under the act at its birth," declared the commissioner when winding up what he will probably recommend. "Farmers, employees in stores and domestic servants will have to be left out, of course; but I want help towards making this selection."

"Perhaps it would be advisable to appoint a board," he continued, "and give it power to make rates and classify the industries which are to be included and which left out."

"The board should certainly be able to make changes, because it would not be proper to have to submit such changes to legislation every time these changes are necessary."

"Another thing. We must make it financially sound, because it would be a calamity if the act fell down ten years after it was placed on the statute. This should also be discriminating in the case of initial payments and charges."

Railways Under the Act.
Dr. L. McCarthy suggested that the Grand Trunk be in favor of a uniform act for the whole of Canada.

"Ours may be a pattern for the whole Dominion," added Sir William.

The G. T. R.'s lawyer pointed out that a difficulty exists through the existence of the Insurance and Provident Society for the employees of that railroad. "Some men will object to leaving the society after paying in large sums."

Sir William Meredith: "It has not been suggested that employees shall get full compensation. By membership in a society like that they would be better off."

"That would not be satisfactory to us. We want the larger employers protected against the smaller," said Mr. Gandier, of the Builders' Exchange. "If these smaller men were offered special rates they would be glad to take advantage of it."

It is understood that a system of capitalizing cost will be levied in the case of building trades.

"My idea is this," said Sir William Meredith. "Create a commission, settle what its scope shall be, assess individually the smaller employers of labor and give them some incentive to join some specific group."
