ered seriously at the time when President Taft entered into reciprocity negotiations with Canada. Several routes have been proposed for the waterway, the cost of which is estimated from \$100,000,000 to \$300,000,-000, but the one most favored in the United States provides for the utilization of all the lakes and the St. Lawrence River. This route, it is contended, would not result in any material lowering of the waters of the great lakes, while it is said a considerable change in the lake levels would result if any of the other proposed routes
