GOVERNMENT STEAMER TO SEARCH FOR WRECKS

The Lambton Has Reached Goderich to Patrol Lake Huron.

GODERICH, May 31.—The Government steamer Lambton has arrived here for the purpose of making a search for sunken wrecks lost in the lakes disaster of November 9. It is thought that two or perhaps three large vessels are lying on the bottom of the south end of Lake Huron. After the storm there were evidences drifted ashore that the steamer Wexford and the McGean had gone down in this vicinity.

Capt. Malcolm McDonald, whose son was on the Wexford, recently went out and established a range of Nafel's point, wherein one of the boats may be lying.

Fishermen Captains McKay and McKay yesterday picked up a lifebelt while out on the lake, but it had been so smashed by the action of the ice that no name could be discerned upon it. These men also claim they saw something far beneath the water a mile or so out from the harbor here, which may be the hull of a vessel.

RECOMMENDS SUBWAY FOR RIDEOUT STREET

Special Council Committee Asks Preparation of Estimates—Asks Better Lighting.

The special committee on subways, meeting at the city hall Saturday night, adopted a report prepared by Chairman W. A. Wilson, which recommends to the council that the city engineer prepare the estimate on a 66-foot subway at Rideout street. The estimate is to be submitted to the council at the second meeting in June.

Chairman Wilson was also instructed to confer with Major Thomas Beattie on the provision in the railway act which guarantees to every municipality government aid on three crossings a year, but not in excess of \$5,000 for each crossing. The members were of the opinion that this aid will not be extended after this year, because the section of the act provides for a fund of one million dollars to be raised by appropriations of \$200,000 a year. This section took effect in 1909, and will run out this year, as the fund will then have been raised.

The question which puzzles the committee is whether demands can be made on this fund after this year. Major Beattie is to take the matter up in Ottawa and inform the committee by telegram.

More Lights for Crossings.
The committee in its report to the council recommends that all railroad crossings in the city be better lighted. Its account of the interview with the city solicitor for his opinion on going to the Dominion Railway Commission for local aid, briefly states that the city solicitor advised against any action at this time because he had definite information that the Grand Trunk was in no financial shape to stand the expense of subways in London.

Should Force Railways.
"It is my opinion we will have to force the railway in this matter," declared Chairman Wilson. "Look how long it took St. Thomas to get the Ross street subway in that city. The chairman of the committee down there tells me they started their agitation in 1903 and the question dragged along because the chairman of the old railroad board died."

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SALVATION ARMY**MOURNS LOSS OF DEAD COMRADES**

Adj. Smith Tells of Lost Ones While Audience Weeps.

BAND PLAYS DEAD MARCH

Crowds Line Streets While Solemn Procession Marches to Barracks for Service.

Services in the Salvation Army Citadel yesterday were the saddest and most impressive ever held by the army. Of the 150 members of the Salvation Army who were on the Empress of Ireland, 139 went down to death in the ship.

Almost all of them were known personally to members in London. Many of them had been here, only a few months ago. When Adjutant George Smith read the list of 139 persons last night, sometimes putting in a few words of explanation, telling the work and stations of each name, there were bowed heads and moist eyes in the congregation.

Read Women's Names.

Mrs. (Adjutant) Smith read the names of the women who went to their death on the ill-fated Empress. She knew personally almost every one of them. Following the outdoor services, the Army marched slowly to their Citadel, playing the Funeral March. The pathos of the piece was more terribly significant to those who heard it than it ever seemed before. More than 500 persons filled the Citadel, in sympathy with these in bereavement.

Adjutant Smith spoke briefly in the evening upon the terrible blow that the army in Canada had suffered in the death of so many of its best and most devoted leaders. Almost all of the drowned were high officers in the army, many other firms have been recently in London.

The afternoon services were held in Victoria Park. They were heard by an immense crowd of people.

YOUNG LADY CALLED AWAY
