The police commissioners refused to taken definite work, as follows, for grant the London policemen a day off duty in each week, which they asked in a petition presented to the commissioners at a meeting vesterday afternoon For many months London policemen have agitated for one day off in seven. Austrian Government, Too, Takes Over Grain Supply

VENICE, via London, Jan. 29.-7:30 p.m.-The Austrian Government has decided to organize a grain monopoly on similar lines to that established by Germany. The Austrian minister of agriculture today announced that the army has procured supplies of grain sufficient to last until the end of August.

Owing to the quantities of barley and maize now being taken for breadstuffs, according to advices from Vienna, there is a serious shortage in the supply of fodder.

DROP IN U. S. STEEL FEATURE OF THE WEEK

C. P. R. Stock Declined Almost Eight Points During the Same Time.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, Jan. 30-(Weekly Market Summary) .- Passing of the dividend on the common stock of the United States Steel Corporation was the unexpected and unsettling feature of the week. The shares fell over eleven points as a result, the authorities of the exchange being impelled to reduce the minimum from 48 to 40, with enormous sales between those features.

Other prominent stocks suffered in lesser degree, losses of three to six points being quite general. Canadian Pacific declined more than any other high-priced railway issue, its loss of almost eight points from last Saturday being ascribed mainly to very unfavorable earnings. Much of the selling of Canadian Pacific and other internationals came from abroad, liquidation from that source being made easier by the removal here of the ban against future deliveries of securities.

Aside from the steel dividend suspension, conditions in that trade pointed toward improvement. Coppers also showed a better tone on the successively higher orices quoted for the metal, but general trade advices were more than usually conflicting. Bank clearings indicated some hesita. ion in the markets for general merchandise, but cash was in greater supply at all reserve centres.
