Present Billet of London Officer of Pats Vividly

Described.

Each one has a dressing-room, and every bed a large canopy; quite the grandest place you ever saw. The one I use is about 25x15, with tiled floor, with a raised grating or lattice about eight feet above

"Throughout the house the floors are inlaid oak, and the rugs are dreams. It is quite the finest house that I have ever been in, and would cost, to build and furnish it, well over a million dollars. The stables are luxurious, with room for eight horses, and a green-house about 80 feet long. The rises in the gardens are simply beyond de-

"The old man gives us lots of wine and of this he must have a cellarfu. Our own cooks and servants wait on us, but his maids make up the rooms and




