

TORONTO FIRM GIVEN CONTRACT FOR PAVEMENT

Warkenton, April 27.—The contract for the paving of Durham street was awarded by the town council at a special meeting Monday night to the Warren Bitulthic Paving Company of Toronto, who tendered for the work at \$60,000. The new roadway will extend from Robert MacGregor's corner beyond the C. P. R. tracks in the east ward to the foot of Bilkie's hill in the west ward, linking up with the county highway. The pavement will be 37 feet wide and it is expected will be completed about the middle of July or in time to be used during Warkenton's Old Boys' and Girls' Celebration, the last week in July.

BILL TO LEGALIZE SALARIES OF THE HYDRO COMMISSION

"Damaged Goods" Picture Neither Entertaining Nor Educational, Says Ferguson.

TORONTO, April 28.—In the Legislature today the bill to legalize payment of \$6,000 salaries to Hon. L. B. Lucas and Colonel Carmichael, members of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, received second reading, and Hon. G. Howard Ferguson announced he would move an amendment when the bill came before the committee.

In discussion on the estimates for the board of moving-picture censors, Hon. Mr. Ferguson made a warm attack on the moving picture "Damaged Goods," which he maintained to be neither entertaining nor educational. Hon. Peter Smith, provincial treasurer, said this film had been cut until there was nothing repugnant. He could bring along 45 ministers of the gospel who approved of the picture.

Commissions Costly.
H. Harley Dewar, Liberal leader, wished to know how much the Hydro-Electric Radial Inquiry Commission, and the Riddell-Latchford Timber Commission inquiry had cost, and were likely to cost. Hon. Mr. Raney said an item for \$100,000 for costs of the latter commission was included in the estimates of the department of lands and forests. As for the hydro radial commission, up to date \$56,000 had been paid out. Hon. Mr. Ferguson said the popular belief was that the hydro radial commission had already cost \$100,000, but this the attorney-general denied. A. C. Lewis (Northeast Toronto) claimed that counsel fees in this inquiry must have totalled \$200,000 to date, and that the total cost of the commission would be \$750,000 before it was through. The premier promised a full statement before the session closed.

RIOTING IN INDIA.
BOMBAY, India, April 28.—The Times of India says today a serious riot is reported to have occurred at Malegaon, northwest of Nasik. The Telegraph wires from that district have been cut and no details of the riot have been received, although a number of constables are reported to have been killed, and a sub-inspector and a magistrate injured. Troops and police have been sent to the scene.

AT THE GRAND.
"The Daughter Pays" is a new Selznick picture which is showing at the Grand Theatre for the last half of this week. It is based on a story written by Mrs. Baillie Reynolds, and treats of the problem of an elderly man and a young and attractive girl. The picture version of the story brings out in a delightful manner the winsome personality of Elaine Hammerstein, who appears in the leading role, and is the character around which centres the great charm of the photoplay. Virginia Mynore is the pretty and lovable daughter of a foolish and selfish mother, and because of impoverished home conditions and a lingering illness which has seized her little sister, she consents to marry Richard Gaunt, who has become a monomaniac through years of brooding over the fact that he and his youth been jilted by Virginia's mother. His revenge lies in the attempt to make his young wife's life one of misery. But the inherent goodness and sweet simplicity of Virginia's character conquers everything, and all misunderstandings are swept away.
The picture teaches an excellent lesson of the impossibility of evil overcoming good. It is a wholesome film, replete with human interest, and gives to those who are fortunate enough to witness it the essence of the story upon which it is founded, with its realism intensified a hundred times.
The film is a beautiful and artistic example of the photographic art, the various scenes being of unusual clearness.
There is also included on the program a number of short subjects, embracing topics, both scenic and educational, and special musical selections.

AT THE MAJESTIC.

The interesting struggle which they wage for the property leads up to an unusual climax.
