Find Biscuit
80 Years of Age

Made in England 1845, But
Shows No Signs of Mould.

Woodstock, Oct. 18.—An eighty-year-old biscuit baked in England in 1845, has come to light in this city. The biscuit known as a "tea biscuit", is in the possession of Mrs. E. Bigham, Light street, whose father, James Veale, brought it with him from England on a sailing ship in the days when passengers had to provide their own food for the Atlantic voyage. The biscuit, which was found in an old trunk used by James Veale on the voyage, shows no sign of mould, but has hardened like clay, although no efforts had been made to preserve it.

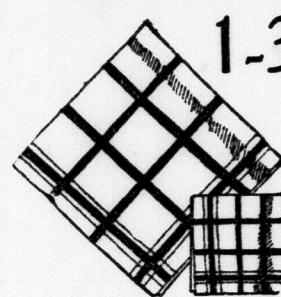

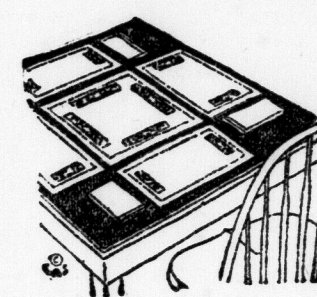

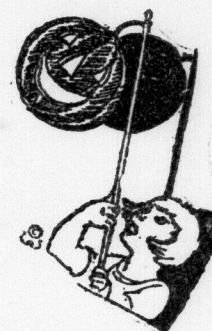

FAILURES DECREASE.

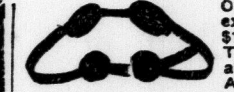
