

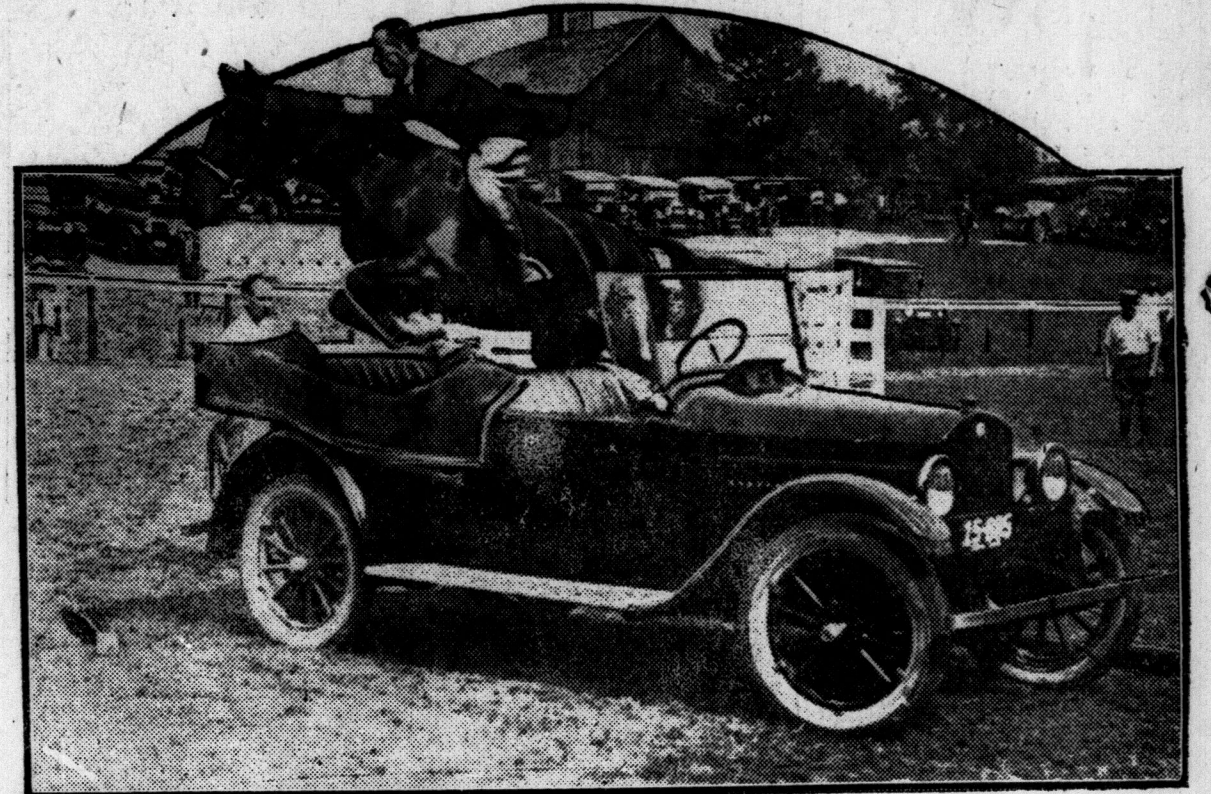

The Prince of Wales presented the silver cup to the all-around boy on the training ship Warspite at Greenhithe.



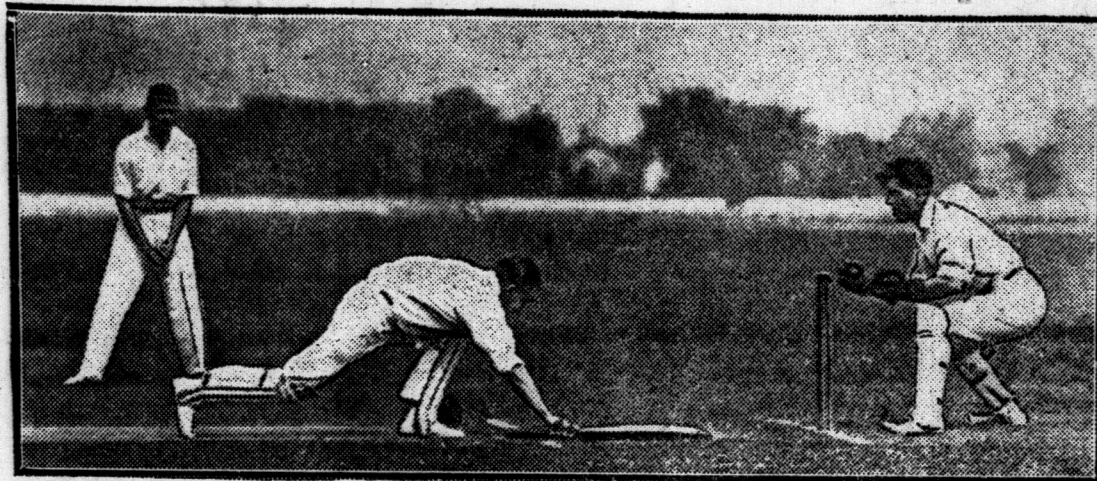
Miss Adelaide Lambert, the fifteen-year-old all around aquatic champion from the Panama Canal zone, clipped the world's 300 meter swimming record recently.



The temporary supremacy of the horse over the automobile was shown at a horse show held recently.



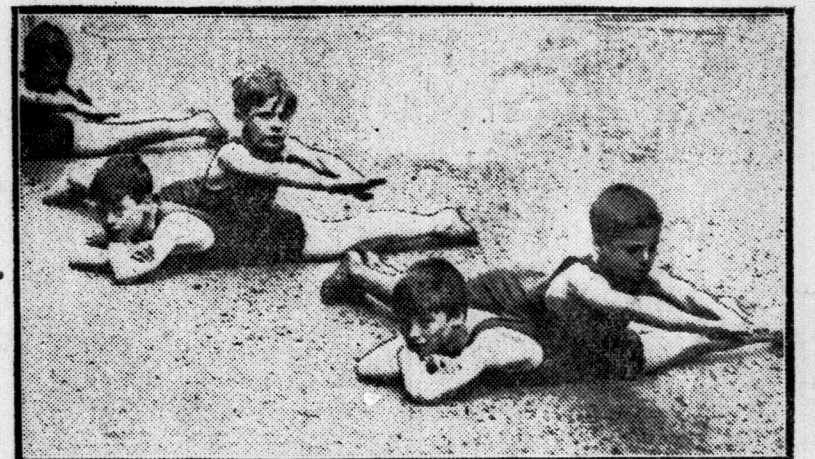
Insane with fear and terror this giant tarpon leaps from the water as he endeavors to free himself of the barb in his mouth.

Swimming lessons on the schoolroom floor are now given in many London schools.



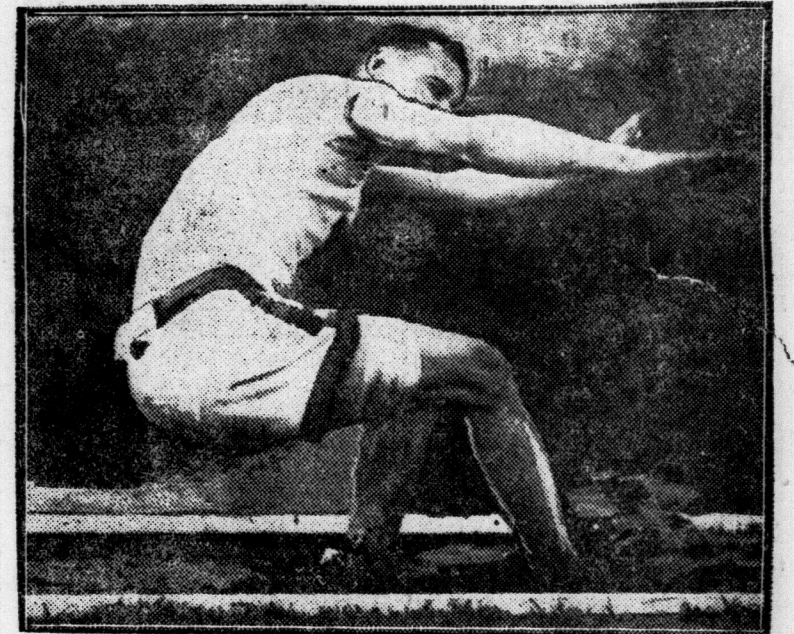
Nose prints are now being taken of dogs on the theory that they get into trouble now and then "just like human beings."

Laddie Boy, the late President Harding's pet dog, must know that there is trouble in the household for he has been very down-hearted since the news of his master's death.



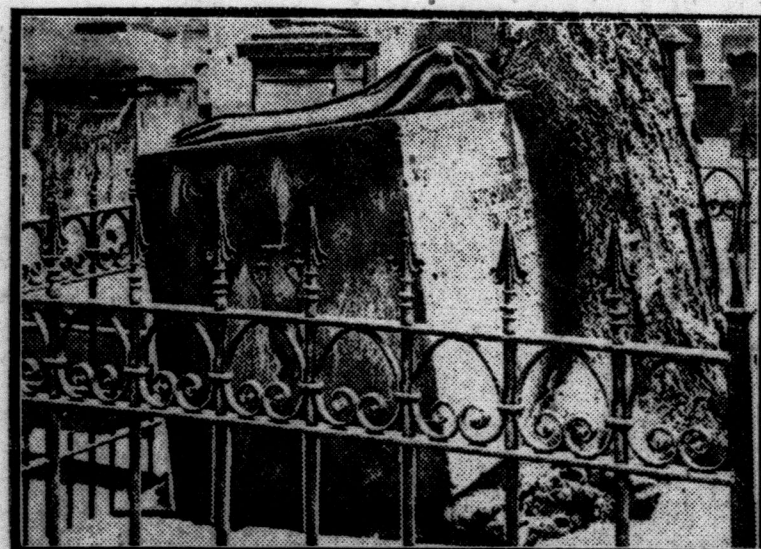
Mlle. Moscovina, beautiful Russian dancer, is creating quite a sensation at the famous summer resort at Deauville.
