The Agricultural Hall. The building at Yonge and Queen streets owned by the Ontario government and known as Agricultural hall has recently been improved and modernized at a cost of \$8000, under the superintendence of Kivas Tully, government architect and engineer. Jamieson, the clothier, has leased the entire ground flat and a portion of the top story for ten years at a rental of nearly \$2000 per annum. Three rooms of the first story are used as offices by the Ontario agricultural and arts association, of which Henry Wade is secretary. The Ontario bureau of statistics, Mr. Blue secretary, occupies three other rooms on the same flat, and in an adjoining room Professor Buckland, secretary of the bureau of agriculture, can be found. Two large rooms, apartments for the caretaker, and Jamieson's work rooms are on the top floor. The government has made the building one of the best on Yonge street.

Sugar growing in Canada. James Allen, a farmer of Dereham township, four miles from Tilsonburg, made 1800 gallons of sorghum syrup this season, and will make 750 more. He charges farmers who grow and bring cane twenty cents a gallon for making, and as 200 gallons can be secured from an acre, which sells at seventy cents a gallon, it will be seen that respectable profits are made by those who grow it. The industry is spreading in west-ontario.
