developing our mineral resources could not be ever-estimated, but to de so many difficulties would have to be over-come. In the first place the establishment of ore works involved the investment of a large amount of capital. The risk in connection with mining operations of all kinds was well known, and in this particular there was not only a risk to be considered incident to such operations but also the risk of the capital invested in the furnace, plant, etc. Capital is not easily induced to embark in any project unless the prospect of gain is in proportion of the risk. In order to minimize the risk it would be necessary to ascertain both the quantity and quality of ores in reach of existing railways by testing with diamond drills and otherwise, "After this is done," said Mr. Rogers, "the company can intelligently locate furnaces, but it must be borne in mind that should such tests prove as satisfactory as we have reason to believe there would still be no absolute certainty about the final results. That could only be ascertained after the metal has been produced. In my judgment the prospect of the success of a modern coke furnace of the capacity proposed is good, but still I don't think that capital unaided can be induced to make the experiment."




