

These edicts are enforced with the utmost rigor in many yarts of the Em-pire and with severity everywhere. The Moscow papers boast that since the beginning of 1891 20,000 Jews who have been driven to a pretended denial of their religious faith in order to escape intolerable persecution have been deported to the dis-trict of Ticherkesova, about five miles from Moscow. There they are rigorously gov-erned by priests of the Russian Orthodox Church, who require them to attend the services of that church and to comply with its various rules, watching narrowly for any sign of evasion or repentance. The police have been making a careful serutiny of the birth papers of the Jews with a view to drive more of them out of the towns, none being allowed to reside in towns except those who are natives. Mos-cow has lost, in consequence of the persecu-tion, a multitude of the most valuable residents. Many of the Jewish tradesmen and artizans who have been driven from Moscow have gone to Codz, a place a few hours by rail from Warsaw, and which hat repidly risen to a population of 125,000, mos of them Laws.
