Perjury Prevalent.

While attention is being drawn to the prevalence of perjury in Canada Courts, which unfortunately is very apparent, the following deliverance of an English Judge is interesting as showing that Canada has not a monopoly of liars on oath.—Judge Edge, of the Metropolitan County Court, in delivering a judgment yesterday, declared that the amount of perjury in English courts was one of the saddest features of English life to-day. Perjury in the law courts, the judge declared, was growing more and more common. People went into the witness box and took the oath knowing that they were going to make a statement that was altogether the opposite of the truth. They did it knowing there was little chance of their being punished, and they lie with a coolness and deliberation which was enough to stagger one.

GEO. BURLEIGH PASSES AWAY.

After a Long Illness Lasting Over Eight Months.

After eight long months of suffering, borne with true christian fortitude, death came on Tuesday, Oct. 16th, to one of Petrolia's well respected citizens, in the person of Mr. George Burleigh, at his home on Princess street, Petrolia. During the greater part of that time Mr. Burleigh was confined to his bed, and though not unexpected the end came as a great shock to his wife and family.

Deceased was born in the town of Thorold, about 58 years ago, where he grew to manhood and was married to Miss Margaret Gillin. From Thorold he came westward making his home at Watford for some 10 or 12 years. He came to Petrolia 13 years ago. During his entire residence here, until his sickness he was employed at his trade as a carpenter with the J. & J. Kerr Co. He was a life long Presbyterian and a member of three lodges—K. O. T. M., C. O. F. and Masonic, with the latter lodge Mr. Burleigh did not retain an active membership after coming to Petrolia.

Besides his wife the deceased is mourned by two sons and one daughter. The former are Bruce of Port Huron, and Ed. at home and the latter Mrs. Jas. McHattie, of Chicago. Two brothers also survive him.—Thos., of Thorold, and John, of Buffalo.

The funeral took place Thursday noon under the auspices of the K. O. T. M. and C. O. F. lodges, which attended in a body.

Rev. Mr. Arnold conducted the service at the family residence, Princess street, at 2.30 o'clock, after which interment took place at Hillsdale.—Petrolia Topic.

SHOT IN THE WOODS.

Youth Accidentally Killed While Hunting Near Metcalfe.

Metcalfe, Oct. 19.—Harry Cummings, Fred Bradshaw and James Johnston, three young men from here, were out hunting yesterday afternoon.

Game being scarce, they began shooting at a mark. Cummings was shooting, but the rifle he was using did not suit him, so he asked Bradshaw to hand him his own rifle, muzzle first. Bradshaw turned the other way and immediately heard the report of the rifle going off. He ran to Cummings and asked him if he were shot. Cummings said yes, and immediately expired.

The bullet entered near the top of the left shoulder and took a downward course, entering the heart.

Cummings is a Barnardo boy. He has been in this country about fourteen years. His only relatives are a sister in England and a brother row on his way to Canada.

Kent Farmer Suicides.

Chatham, Oct. 19.—L. K. Silverthorne, at one time one of the most prosperous farmers in Kent County, ended his life some time Wednesday afternoon by hanging himself from a beam in his barn.

He was last seen Wednesday at noon, when he seemed have a fit of melancholia caused by financial difficulties. He went out after the meal and did not return at supper time.

His wife went out to look for him and found him in the barn, suspended from a beam, dead.

The unfortunate man was 54 years of age, and lived on the 14th concession of Raleigh. Several financial reverses caused him to become despondent.

Wife Has to Pay Jail Board for Windsor Tailor.

Sandwich, Ont., Oct. 19.—Some time ago Arthur B. Baxter, a Windsor tailor, was ordered by the court to pay for his wife, with whom he was not living, a certain alimony. He refused to do so and was committed to jail here. After having been confined a short time Baxter's lawyer secured an order compelling Mrs. Baxter to pay her husband's board while he was held in jail. It is said that she has failed to pay for the past two or three weeks and that Baxter's lawyer will move for an order of release.
