Halifax, May 4.—There has been some nisunderstanding as to the action of the Halifax, May 4.—There has been some misunderstanding as to the action of the military authorities regarding the famous old citadel in this city. The policy of the authorities now is to rely for defence on the atrong batteries on both sides of the outer harbor and those on Macnab's and George's islands, rather than on the citadel, which is the old centre of the defences of the station. The batteries nearer the mouth of the harbor are being strengthened. The citadel will be used as a place for extensive barracks. The imperial government has awarded a contract to Brookfield for a barracks within its area to cost \$35,000. But the citadel has not been condemned, and while the large obsolete guns which were on its ramparts are being removed and will not all be replaced, the authorities are putting in position a number of Maxims, which are better suited to the nature of the defence that would be carried on from that point were hostilities to break out. The authorities are vigorously strengthening the other fortifications of Halifax.


