Died in His Chair.

The town of Digby was shocked on the night of the 15th inst. by the sudden death of James H. Wade, which occurred there at 5.30 p. m.

Mr. Wade was sitting in his chair, in conversation with Miss Eunice Jones, sister of Mrs. Wade, when he suddenly expired. Mr. Wade was visiting relatives at Brighton at the time of his husband's death.

The deceased was a well-known carpenter and contractor, and had reached the advanced age of 77 years. He was a son of the late James Wade who died aged 94 years, and a nephew of the late Job Wade of Granville Ferry who died at the age of 104. He was the last of six brothers, but is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Robt. Bath of Somersetville, Mass., and Mrs. Albert Bath of Bridgetown, N. S. He had no family, but is survived by a widow. Mr. Wade was a Conservative in politics, was very much interested in the summer tourist business in Digby, and had accommodated many guests at his home during the past few years. The body was interred in St. Paul's (Episcopal) Cemetery, Marshalltown, the service being conducted by Rev. Mr. Dal'lock of Halifax.
