TUBERCULOSIS

The story which Dr. W. H. Battle Provincial Health Officer, tells of the destruction of human life by tuberculous

loss is not by any means pleasant reading. But it is well to know it and think about it, and to ascertain the best methods of preventing it and of dealing with it on the first sign of its presence.

A large number of the young men of our Province have during the past two and a half years made the supreme sacrifice upon the battle field

but the number does not equal that of the men and women of our Province who have yielded to the onslaughts of the dreaded disease. Dr. Hattie assures us that eight thousand add four hundred deaths by tuberculosis in the last eight years is the tale which our Provincial records tell.

The organism which produces the disease is very minute, only about one ten thousandth part of an inch in length, and from one fifty thousandth to one twenty thousandth part of an inch in thickness.

The report from the Provincial Sanatorium in Kentville assures us that forty per cent of the patients treated have been quite restored, or sufficiently well to be able to work.

Three principal factors are employed in the treatment. First, there must be plenty of fresh air, air in motion, out-doors air. Second, plenty of suitable, nourishing food.

Other diseases which have been scourges of humanity have been conquered. This ailment may be conquered and become a thing of the past.
