HAWKER TELLS OF RESCUE

The Sea Was Exceedingly Rough When Taken off by Small Boat

LONDON, May 26—Harry G. Hawker, in his account of his flight from Newfoundland, after describing how he was forced to descend to the sea, to be picked up by the Danish steamer Mary:

"The sea was exceedingly rough, and despite the utmost efforts of the Danish crew it was ninety minutes before they succeeded in taking us off. It was only at great risk to themselves, in fact, that they eventually succeeded in launching a small boat, owing to the heavy gale from the northeast which was raging.

"It was found impossible to salvage the machine, which, however, most probably is still afloat somewhere in mid ocean.

"Altogether before being picked up we had been fourteen and a half hours out from Newfoundland, and we were picked up at 8.30 a. m. Greenwich time.

"From Capt. Duhn of the Mary and his Danish crew we received the greatest kindness on the journey home. The ship carries no wireless and it was not until we arrived the Butt of Lewis that we were able to communicate with the authorities. Off Loch Ernhol we were met by the destroyer Woolson and conveyed to the Scapa Flow, where we had splendid welcome from Admiral Fremantle and the men of the Grand Fleet."

Rev. Howard Whidden, M. P. President of Brandon College, preached the annual sermon at Acadia University, Wolfville, on Sunday.

On Monday evening the Academy closing exercises were held. Principal Archibald reported a total attendance of 247. He presented 18 matriculation diplomas, 10 certificates and in the business department 24 diplomas and 39 certificates.

The 81st Anniversary exercises of the college took place Wednesday morning. The B. A. degree was conferred upon 22 graduates; F. McAvoy received the B. of T.; F. M. Archibald the B. Sc. and there were five M. A. degrees, Miss Jennie Welton of Kingston being one of the recipients.

Seven engineering certificates were presented, E. S. Bishop, Paradise; M. D. Shaffner, Lawrencetown; and C. R. Welton, Tremont, being among those receiving them.

An L. L. D. was conferred upon Lt.-Gov. Grant; a D. C. L. upon H. T. Ross, Montreal; a D. D. upon Rev. B. Green, Moncton; a B. Sc. upon F. H. Sexton, and an M. A. upon Dr. C. W. Lewis.

Donations of \$135,000 were announced.

Deputy Head for Fisheries Promised.

Ottawa, May 27.—The Minister of Marine and Fisheries made a statement of great importance to-night regarding the fisheries of Canada. For some time representations have been made to the Government that fisheries should be under a separate Deputy and greater attention given to their exploitation generally. He has his estimates an increase of one hundred thousand dollars to be applied to the further expansion of the fisheries of Canada. Canada will be divided into three sections—Atlantic provinces, Prairie provinces and British Columbia, each being under a chief inspector with an overseer for each district in the different section, who will give his whole time to the work. Special guardians will also be appointed at certain time of the year. More steam trawlers will be encouraged to engage in the business.
