Mr. John Lundrigan (Gander-Twillingate): Mr. Speaker, I have a supplementary question which I wish to direct to the Minister of Transport, asking why only the Newfoundland railway passenger service was discontinued in view of the fact that all C.N. rail passenger services across Canada are costing money. Bearing this in mind, when are plans to be finalized for the discontinuance of railway passenger services in other provinces of Canada?
