LABOUR CONDITIONS

BELL ISLAND, NFLD.—ASSISTANCE FOR UNEMPLOYED MINERS

On the orders of the day:

Mr. T. C. Douglas (Burnaby-Coquitlam): I wish to address a question to the Minister of Industry, and first say how glad we are to have him back in our midst. Last week the Prime Minister said that more than one department was looking into the problem facing the people on Bell Island, Newfoundland, and the Minister of Manpower and Immigration told us what his department was doing in this connection. I want to ask the Minister of Industry whether his department is conducting research, either on its own or through the National Research Council, into the possibility of upgrading the ore deposits on Bell Island or pelletizing the ore there in order to make use of the two billion tons of recoverable ore which are estimated to be on the island.

Hon. C. M. Drury (Minister of Industry): I thank the hon. gentleman for his kind expression of welcome. As far as Bell Island is concerned, extensive investigations were carried out about two and a half years ago as to the possibility of chemical treatment of the ore to make it appropriate for use in Canadian furnaces. I regret to say that in spite of the intensive research work done we have not as yet produced an economic answer.

Mr. Douglas: As a supplementary question may I ask the minister by whom these tests were conducted, and is it possible to get copies of the report?

Mr. Drury: Basically, Mr. Speaker, by the National Research Council together with outside consultants, and I will see if it is possible to make a copy of the report available to the hon. gentleman.

Mr. Joseph P. O'Keefe (St. John's East): May I ask the minister if those steps will be continued to investigate the problems of the ore at Bell Island.

Mr. Drury: Mr. Speaker, I do not think the conclusions of those conducting these investigations were such as to warrant or justify continuing them any further.
