EVIDENCE OF MERCURY POISONING AMONG INDIANS IN QUEBEC—GOVERNMENT ACTION TO PROVIDE ALTERNATE SOURCE OF PROTEIN

Mr. Stuart Leggatt (New Westminster): Mr. Speaker, my question is addressed to the Minister of National Health and Welfare and it concerns his responsibility for the health of the native people of Canada. A report issued by Dr. Barbeau of the provincial health department in Quebec states that out of 48 Cree Indians examined 20 have signs of Minimata disease and three are confirmed as having brain damage. Since the main source of protein in that area, as it was in Grassy Narrows, is fish, and since the summer season for these people is approaching, what plans has the government made with regard to providing alternate protein sources for these people? Are we going to say again, "don't eat fish"?

Marc Lalonde (Minister of National Health and Welfare): Mr. Speaker, first of all, Dr. Barbeau is not a civil servant of the provincial government, but an eminent doctor practising in a Montreal hospital. About the question relating to the protein and the food taken by the Indians concerned, we are in very close consultation with the provincial government in an attempt to correct the situation and plans are under review on this matter. As the hon. member knows, the mercury contamination in this area seems to stem from natural elements. It is an exceptional situation. Comprehensive measures therefore will have to be taken throughout the whole region.

MERCURY POISONING AMONG INDIANS—SUGGESTED MASSIVE EXAMINATION OF NATIVES TO IDENTIFY VICTIMS

Mr. Stuart Leggatt (New Westminster): A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. That "exceptional situation" appears to be arising all across the country. The National Indian Brotherhood have identified vast areas where there is potential Minamata disease. In view of the fact that there have only been 48 examinations in this particular area of complaints, would the minister's department make some kind of massive examination of those people who are now living in areas which appear to be contaminated? In other words, when are we going to start doing something to prevent an epidemic of mercury poisoning in Canada?

Hon. Marc Lalonde (Minister of National Health and Welfare): Mr. Speaker, I would not want the hon. member to spread panic among the people concerned. In each area involved, doctors regularly perform intensive tests. We have asked for the cooperation of the population everywhere there seems to be problems. Most of the times, we are dealing with a nomadic population which is hard to get in touch with, but all possible efforts are made, with the cooperation of the provincial governments, to contact the Indians concerned. All I can say to the hon. member is that we are trying our best to trace as soon as possible everyone
