Increase in General Assessment Helped Towards This End.

BETTER ROADS NEED

These figures were not arrived at without considerable discussion, as the constantly increasing population in the southern sections of the township creates an ever increasing demand for better roads and other improvements that the farming communities cannot get along without, yet the same rate must be levied thruout the whole township.
