

RED LETTER DAY TO SONS OF ITALY

Local Colony Royally Celebrate Forty-Third Anniversary of Freedom.

TWO HUNDRED PRESENT

Banquet at Italian National Club Saturday Night Had Many Speakers.

Sept. 20 is a memorable day in Italian history, and in the countries of the world where Italians are to be found that day is the most important on the calendar. In Toronto, as well as in all other places in Canada where the children of sunny Italy have fixed their abode, carnival high on the day on which the forty-third anniversary of the establishment of freedom in the land where papa ruled is being celebrated for so many centuries was celebrated. It was in honor of Sept. 20, 1870, that some two hundred Italians gathered in the famous rooms of the Italian National Club on Saturday night, when Manager C. M. Saxon threw that establishment open to his compatriots in celebration of the unification of Italy and the obtaining of freedom for her sons.

The gathering would undoubtedly have been much larger had it not been for the unfavorable weather conditions, but even so a very patriotic and enthusiastic assemblage was present. Over the arch of the doorway hung a picture of King Victor Emmanuel, while on the left hung the Canadian ensign, and on the right was draped the tricolor of a united Italy. The name of Garibaldi was on every tongue, and also the remarks of the speakers could not be understood by an Anglo-Saxon there was no mistaking the sentiments expressed. "La Belle Italiana" and "Garibaldi" were often repeated, and they were generally the signal for enthusiastic outbursts. One speech was made in English, and it was very well delivered, dealing comprehensively with the details of a struggle for freedom in which all Italians are vitally interested.

Musical features were not wanting, either, and the orchestra which rendered musical numbers during the evening again demonstrated that the Italian is a very music-loving people. The Italian royal march evoked hearty applause, every man in the gathering being brought to his feet with head bowed when the familiar strains of the "March Reale" were heard. Those present were: Messrs. V. Piccinini, Joseph Glionna, Dr. Glionna, J. Cori, editor of La Tribuna Canadiana, Francis Nicoletti, president of the Italian Club, R. V. Glionna, and M. Sacco. A distinguished visitor in the person of V. Cori, editor of La Tribuna Canadiana, was also present and gave an address.

The Italian societies were strongly represented, many having of the Open Opera Umberto Primo and Victor Emmanuel societies being noted. Telegrams of respect were read from George H. Good, M.L.A.; Edgar Cheney and E. W. J. Owens. Mr. Glionna, in his speech, here and in the various countries of the world where Italians were to be found were all celebrating the anniversary of the obtaining of Italian freedom. The career of the famous Italian patriot was described in detail, and the recalling of the struggles of this patriotic life in striving for the freedom of his country evoked very great applause from the audience.

Dr. Harley Smith and H. Cori, as well as nearly all the other speakers of the evening, spoke in Italian, and the applause that punctuated their remarks indicated in no uncertain manner the kind of sentiment which they expressed.

The patriotic gathering broke up with three cheers for King and country.

Real Estate News REALTY IS GOOD DEALS PROVE IT

Builders Coming Back Into Market With Return of Cheaper Loans.

MONEY NOW EASIER

High Priced Houses on Helliwell Estate Sold Without Roofs.

The real estate man's optimism of a few weeks ago is turning into enthusiasm. Money is loosening up and builders are buying again. That means the market is enjoying the best boost it could get.

Building loans are now obtainable at 6 1/2 per cent. from almost any lender. The only place where more is being asked is at the loan companies, and there are quite a few men around town who frankly say the companies are oversteering themselves in keeping their rates at 7 per cent. and higher.

The drop in rates had to come. For three months very little money has been used for building purposes, although the supplies have kept accumulating. In some quarters there is a distinct surplus of ready cash. Then out went they are selling a record crop, a crop of high yields and very high grades. In Toronto the demand for the builders' wares has steadily held, and with a limited amount of construction has become many times greater than the supply. H. H. Williams, E. A. English and other firms dealing in houses, say they never sold so many as now.

Eachens said that the sale of building land is becoming quite prominent. Last Thursday A. C. Bond, a builder, bought 400 feet in Kingsmont from them; he will build 20 houses. On Friday W. A. Gardner purchased 300 feet in the same place for ten houses. Martin & Co. are starting five houses in Rivercourt that will cost \$7000 each. During the week 1200 feet was sold in this addition, and mostly for building use.

There is no difficulty now in getting building loans. All the legal firms that we get building loans from have plenty at 6 1/2. Money is easier now than it has been since January.

Mr. Norman McEachern, "On Helliwell estate there are 24 \$5000 houses with 'sold' signs on them and only three of these houses are still without roofs."

PUBLIC RECEPTION TO GENERAL BOOTH

Leader of Salvation Army Will Attend Annual Congress Here.

General Bramwell Booth has announced his acceptance of the invitation to be present at the annual congress of the Canadian branch of the Salvation Army, on November 5, in the Toronto headquarters of the army.

Landing at New York, Gen. Booth purposes coming to Toronto, expecting to arrive here at noon on Saturday, November 1. After being tendered a welcome at the station by Mayor Hocken, on the day of the chief authorities, a public reception will be given for the distinguished Salvation Army leader.

Three speeches will be given on Sunday by General Booth at Massey Hall, where morning, afternoon and evening meetings will be held. At one of the sessions, probably in the afternoon, His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Sir John Gibson will preside.

At the three days' congress General Booth will, of course, be the most prominent figure, and it is likely that he will deliver a number of addresses. On the day following the close of the congress, he will leave for Winnipeg, and on the conclusion of a brief stay will embark from Vancouver for England, ending what will be his first Canadian visit since attaining the position of leader of the Army.
