## MILITANTS CAUSED A LIVELY BATTLE

Howled Down Socialist Snow-  
don and Strenuous Conflict  
Was Precipitated.

SHEFFIELD, England, Nov. 17.—(Can. Press.)—A wild suffragette disturbance occurred here tonight. Philip Snowden, Socialist member of parliament for Blackburn, attempted to address a "no conscription" meeting arranged by the Labor party, but was howled down by suffragettes. Stewards promptly took a hand, and in the scuffle were attacked also by male sympathizers with the women. Some of the stewards were kicked and badly bruised. In spite of the fact that many of the disturbers were elected, the uproar persisted to such an extent that at the end of half an hour the meeting was abandoned. A large section of the audience displayed anger at the chairman for calling the police to his aid, declaring that the working classes had had enough of the police.

## ELEVEN EXECUTED BY REBEL FORCES

Capture of Juarez Was Followed by Reign of Blood.

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 17.—(Can. Press.)—Eleven men are known to have been executed in Juarez since Francisco Pancho Villa and his rebel forces captured the city on Saturday morning. The rebel officials admit the execution of that number. The bodies of most of the victims are still unburied. More than twenty corpses, some of them of men executed, some of bodies of victims of the battle, lay all night in the rain in the Juarez Cemetery, because graves had not been completed for them. The body of Col. Enrique Portillo, executed on Saturday, was brought to El Paso for interment here today. It was discovered of its trousers and shoes by a rebel who was short of clothing while it lay in the military barracks in Juarez. All rebels are badly in need of clothing, and the distribution of captured federal uniforms made by Villa did not go around, so there has been a scramble for the clothing of the men executed.

### LORD COWDRAY DENIES MEDDLING IN MEXICO

Had Nothing to Do With Carden's Appointment as Ambassador.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—(Can. Press.)—Speaking for himself and any company in which he is interested, Lord Cowdray writes to the newspapers denying that Sir Lionel Carden was appointed minister to Mexico by his wish or suggestion, that he himself is concerned directly or indirectly in financial or other matters of Mexican Government, except to the extent of having participated to the amount of less than three per cent. in a loan negotiated two months ago to the National Bank of Mexico. Lord Cowdray further denies that the Madero administration cancelled the concessions granted to the Pearson Co. by the Diaz government or that the Pearson sought of concessions or an oil monopoly from the Huerta government, or that he participated directly or indirectly in the overthrowing of the Madero government. ## EGYPTIAN ART DEALS WITH LIFE IN REPOSE

Principle Underlying Pyramid Decoration Outlined by Professor Muller.

Engineering and artistic achievements of the Egyptians of the time of the pyramids were faithfully portrayed by Prof. Max Muller of the University of Pennsylvania in an address which he delivered to University of Toronto students in the physics building last evening. Lantern slides of the massive structures built by the people of the Nile valley showed to what a degree of civilization this race had advanced.
