EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 17.—(Can. Press.)—Eleven men are known to have been executed in Juarez since Francisco Pancho Villa and his rebel forces captured the city on Saturday morning. The rebel officials admit the execution of that number. The bodies of most of the victims are still unburied.

LORD COWDRAY DENIES
MEDDLING IN MEXICO

Had Nothing to Do With Carden's Appointment as Ambassador.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—(Can. Press.)—Speaking for himself and any company in which he is interested, Lord Cowdray writes to the newspapers denying that Sir Lionel Carden was appointed minister to Mexico by his wish or suggestion. He states that he himself is concerned directly or indirectly in financing the present de facto Mexican Government, except to the extent of having participated to the amount of less than three per cent. in a loan negotiated two months ago to the National Bank of Mexico.

EGYPTIAN ART DEALS
WITH LIFE IN REPOSE

Principle Underlying Pyramid Decoration Outlined by Professor Muller.

Engineering and artistic achievements of the Egyptians in the time of the pyramids were faithfully portrayed by Prof. Max Muller of the University of Pennsylvania in an address which he delivered to University of Toronto students in the physics building last evening. Lantern slides of the massive structures built by the people of the Nile Valley showed to what a degree of civilization this race had advanced. The people were at this time still users of stone weapons and bronze to any extent. Each king built a pyramid, and the longer his reign the larger the structure which was erected. Each monarch would be interred in the structure. The theory that these huge monuments were built for astronomical purposes was cast aside as absolutely false. The degree of proficiency attained by jewelers and cabinet makers was described by Prof. Muller. The object of those who were the exponents of the arts was to represent truthfully and not to flatter; they aimed not to show action, but to picture a period of repose. This lecture was largely attended by Yearling students and also by the general public. The French people are great chicken raisers.
