NEAR FOES' STRONGHOLD German Cruisers and Torpedo Boats Quickly on Scene.

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Oct. 7, 12.30 a.m.—A despatch to the Central News from Harwich, England, says that a rumor is in circulation there of the sinking of a German cruiser in addition to the German torpedo-boat destroyer.

LONDON, Oct. 7, 6.55 p.m.—The admiralty announces that the British submarine E9 has returned safely after having torpedoed and sunk a German torpedo-boat destroyer off the estuary of the River Ems, between the Netherlands and East Friesland in the North Sea.

ST. CATHARINES MAN SLAIN MURDER WAS DELIBERATE

Private Burgoyne, of Nineteenth Regiment, Popular Bank Clerk, Killed in Cold Blood by Fellow Soldier in Altercation—Private Hartley, Slayer, Arrested on Capital Charge.

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Oct. 7.—Private Theodore Burgoyne, 19, who in private life was a clerk in the St. Catharines branch of the Bank of Toronto, and a general favorite in social circles and among the soldiers of the 19th Regiment, as a member of which he was serving as a guard on the Welland Canal, was shot dead tonight by a rifle in the hands of Private Frank Hartley, on duty at the canal.

ANOTHER BELGIAN TOWN BOMBARDED. ROME, Oct. 7.—(Via Paris, 11.20 p.m.)—A telegram received here from Berlin says: "The civilians at Lanaeken, Belgium, having attacked German troops, reprisals were necessary. Lanaeken was bombarded and its church destroyed. Along the road between Lanaeken and Tongres all the houses were burned."
