or marking out the rows for planting, a "corn marker" may be  
ed to advantage. It is made by taking a piece of scantling, 3  
ches square and 10 to 12 feet long, with teeth, of hickory or  
White Oak inserted at distances of 2 to 4 feet, according to the
