arrow—if you have a good lot of compost manure, give a good p dressing, and plough it in with a shallow furrow, leaving the d sward undisturbed. If the soil is light and mellow, it is referable to plough and subsoil in the spring, first spreading on e coarse unfermented manure, which is to be ploughed in. or marking out the rows for planting, a "corn marker" may be sed to advantage. It is made by taking a piece of scantling, 3 ches square and 10 to 12 feet long, with teeth, of hickory or hite Oak inserted at distances of 2 to 4 feet, according to the idth designed for the rows—then an old pair of waggon-thills d a pair of old plough handles are put to it, and your marker done, and with a good horse to draw this implement, the ound may be made ready for planting very rapidly.
