KING EDWARD BRIDGE IS ALLOWED

Works Committee Agree to Permit a Seven-Storey Corridor Eight Feet Wide to Be Built Across Colborne Street—Precedent Made for 42-Foot Roadways.

After hearing Architect E. J. Lennox's arguments as to the necessity of connecting the King Edward Hotel with their proposed annex by means of a bridge corridor, the committee on works endorsed the scheme at its meeting yesterday afternoon. Assessment Commissioner Forman was instructed to notify all the property holders on Colborne street between Yonge and Church streets, that the council would deal with this matter at its next meeting. This course was taken in order that any serious protest might be considered before the hotel company is granted a permit.

The proposed bridge corridor is to be 21 feet above the street level, and will connect the annex to be built at the southeast corner of Scott and Colborne streets with the hotel from the third to the tenth story by means of seven corridors over Colborne street. These will be from eight to eleven feet wide, and the appearance will be that of a gigantic wall sustained by steel girders between the two buildings.

While only Ald. McBride opposed the scheme, the other members of the committee were somewhat reluctant to put themselves on record as favoring the proposition. Mr. Lennox, however, assured the aldermen that the hotel had no other possible means of expansion, and it was only after negotiations which lasted for nearly three years that they were able to obtain the site they did. A 14-storey annex would be erected, he said, and 200 extra rooms would be provided. The travelling public which demanded the cheaper accommodation, would be the majority of the rooms would be rented at \$1.50 a day. Controller Hocken suggested that the hotel be asked to give a bond of indemnity for any land damages which might be incurred, but this point was not dealt with.

Don Mills road appeared before the committee and urged that a 42-foot asphalt pavement be laid on that street instead of the original 24-foot proposal. A 24-foot street, however, was all that could be reasonably be charged to them as a local improvement, they claimed and hence they asked that the city pay for the additional 18 feet. Their requests were all granted in Commission. Mr. Harris' report upon the matter, which was read to them, Asst. Eng. Powell, however, pointed out that the same situation was to be found on Dovercourt road, and hence the committee instructed Commissioner Harris to alter his original recommendation in order that the pavement might be laid upon the same basis as Don Mills road. The committee agreed that they had established a precedent, which must be followed in all similar roadways in the future.

Queen Street Sidewalk. Ald. Austin's proposal to lay a concrete walk on the south side of Queen street, between the subway and Strachan avenue, met with favor and it was recommended by the committee. Some discussion arose as to whether the G.T.R., as owners of the asylum property, could be legally made to pay for that portion of the property fronting on their ground. Assessment Commissioner Forman, however, stated that this was quite legal.

The proposal to round the northeast corner of Gerrard and Parliament streets was referred to Commissioner Forman to take what action he deemed expedient.

A Big Fee. J. T. Liddell, who was injured while engaged on the St. Clair avenue electric car line work last March, was attended by Dr. J. R. Gibson, who put in a bill to the city for \$350. Some of the aldermen considered this charge excessive, but it was decided to recommend the payment provided that the doctor submitted an itemized account.

The committee carried the proposed extension of Brock avenue northerly to Walla ce avenue, but did not discuss the proposal of the extension of Crawford street to College street, which could be carried out by means of a "fill" at Sully crescent.

Special Meeting. Commissioner Forman's figures, showing that the widening of Teraulay street to eighty-six feet would cost \$5,500,000, were not discussed, and it was decided to deal with the whole matter at a special meeting, to be called on Wednesday afternoon.

Bad Water. The strong taste of chlorine in the water is still a mystery to the medical health department. Dr. Hastings stated yesterday that it was a puzzle to him and he could advance no theory to account for it. In consequence of the objectionable taste the quantity of chlorine of time used has been reduced from 2.5 to 1.2, but yesterday almost no improvement was noticeable. It is hoped, however, that a change for the better will take place today.

C.N.R. ENTRANCE TO WINDSOR.

WINDSOR, Ont., Sept. 6.—Fifty acres of land, for which \$50,000 was paid, have just been purchased in Sandwich East by the Canadian Northern Railway as an entrance into Windsor and Walkerville. The land is situated at the junction of the Grand Trunk Railway and the Essex Terminal Railway, a point which has branch lines connecting with the factory district here.
