Many Chestnut Trees Doomed.

A communication was read to the Parks and Exhibition Committee from Mr. William Kough, referring to the tussock moth mow infesting the chestnut trees of this city. This gentleman said that during the past month the paris green that had been used had done little damage to the cateropillar, but more to the foliage. He thought a man should be employed to go around with a torch and burn them off. Park (Commissioner Chambers said that a smear had been placed around the trees to prevent the insects going up, and no leaves thad been affected by paris green, and therefore very few moths up the trees. "The trouble is," said Mr. Chambers, "they are igoing to lose all their chestnut trees, which must have moisture, and on Sherbourne-street, together with the asphalt pavement and the granolithic sidewalks, it is not possible for them to receive this. There's just room for the tree to stand in, and the feeding roots at the top have been cut off; the consequence is that these trees are now shedding their foliage, when they should not do go till October.
